CAMPFIRE PERMITS ARE NOW REQUIRED

Campfire permits are required at all unposted National Forest camps. Campfire permits may be secured from the Redwood Ranger Station in Cave Junction, at the Store Gulch Guard Station or from the Forest Supervisor's office in Grants Pass. Permits for State-protected areas may be secured from John Moe at the Kerby Guard Station.

Forests camps at Tannen Lake, Bolan Lake, Sanger Lake, Gray-back, Elk Valley and Store Gulch do not require campfire permits.

Campfires must never be left burning when unattended. Be sure to thoroughly extinguish the fire when leaving or breaking camp. Smokers are asked to stop and smoke in a safe place, not smoking while traveling on a forest road or trail, or while walking through the woods.

These requirements are instituted in close cooperation with the "Keep Oregon Green" association and the Oregon State Forester. Compliance by all forest users is essential to protect our natural resources and our local payrolls from destruction by fire.

MAJOR FIRE LAWS SUMMARIZED FOR FARMER GUIDANCE

Now that the danger season for forest fires is approaching a digest of the Oregon forest fire laws that apply particularly to farmers and woodlot owners has been prepared by Charles R. Ross, OSC extension forester.

In summarizing seven of the more significant laws, Ross has attempted to give the highlights as they apply to farmers and rural residents. The summary follows:

The Permit Law: Persons who wish to burn forest land, grass, grain stubble or stumps must secure written permission from a fire warden during the closed season which runs normally from May 15 to December 31.

Cigarette and Match Law: During the closed season, it is unlawful for anyone to throw away lighted tobacco matches or other material on any forest land, private road, public highway or railroad right of way.

Campfire Law: Persons building campfires on land not their own are required to clear the ground immediately around the fire. Campfires must not be left unattended.

Willful Setting of Fire: Persons convicted of setting incendiary fires are liable to prison sentences.

Operator's Permit Law: Anyone desiring to use fire or to use power driven machinery in connection with logging of forest land is required to get a permit annually from the State Forester.

Slash Burning Law: Individuals or companies that harvest forest products are required to burn slash each year if it is a fire hazard. The burning is supervised by fire wardens. Land owners share in responsibility for reducing slash hazards on their lands.

Closure Law: The governor's proclamation may totally or partially close such forest areas to all forms of use where fire danger is considered especially dangerous.

JULY 31st IS LAST CHANCE FOR G. I.'S

July 31 is the last chance for World War II veterans to reinstate their lapsed GI term insurance without the requirement of a physical examination, the Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs warned today.

The state veterans' agency, in urging veterans to reinstate, pointed out that the price of two monthly premiums is the only cost.

A statement to the effect that the veteran is in as good physical condition as he was at the time his insurance lapsed, will suffice for most veterans. After July 31 a physical examination will be required to reinstate, where the insurance has lapsed more than three months.

Term insurance, veterans are reminded, is the same type carried during active service in the armed forces. It is the lowest cost life insurance available.
