As secretary of state, Newbry is carrying out a policy of establishing motor vehicle license distributing centers in each county of the state. This system will utilize state employees who issue drivers licenses and will result in a saving of state funds and better service to vehicle owners. Plans include issuance of permanent plates, to be renewed annually, starting in 1950.

eau of land management, Sunday warned that October 5 is the deadline for filing of a copy of the notice of location of mining claims on the Oregon and California railroad grant lands and reconveyed Coos Bay wagon road grant lands.

Owners of all claims located on O. & C. land prior to last April 8 must file for record, not later than October 5, in the Oregon district land office at Swan Island, a copy of the location of the claim as filed in its county records, he declared.

For mining claims located after last April 8, notices must be filed within 60 days of the date of such mining location, Horning said.

The filing requirement is contained in interior department regulations issued July 27, which also provide that claim owners must file, in the Oregon district land office within 60 days after the expiration of any annual assessment year, a sworn statement detailing assessment work completed.
