OBITUARY

Dr. William Addison Brown was born October 27, 1872 in Winston, Missouri, the son of Wilson S. and Rebecca Revert Brown, and was one of six children, four boys and two girls. In early life the family moved to Kansas City where the sons went into the printing business, which is still carried on by nephews of the family.

Dr. Brown graduated from Baker University, Baldwin, Kansas in 1897, and later from Drew Theological Seminary, Madison N. J. His first pastoral charge was in St. Louis, Missouri. He was married in 1900 to Dora Belle Taggart of White City, Kansas, and together they served in pastorates in Manila, P. I.; Kansas City, Kansas; University Methodist church in Los Angeles; American church in Buenos Aires, Argentina; and as Personnel Pastor in Wesley Methodist church in Minneapolis, Minnesota. He saw missionary service in the Philippines, also in South America; was for seven years the Western Field secretary of the Young Peoples Missionary movement of North America, and for eight years was the Missionary secretary of the International Sunday School association of U. S. and Canada, and served as a director of the Laymen's Missionary movement, also of the Men and Religion movement.

He has one son, Robert William of Pittsburg Pennsylvania, who is with the Carnegie Steel Co., and who has two sons, William and David.

Since 1937 Dr. Brown has been retired and living with Mrs. Brown

at "La Casa Willadora" on the Redwood highway, south of Cave Junction, Oregon.

FELLOW ALUMNI OF OSC REMEMBER-GOV. M'KAY AS 'BIG SHOT'

Oregon State College—Joining in good wishes to Governor Doug McKay at his inauguration January 10th were numerous O. S. C. alumni who "knew him when." The new governor was graduated in agriculture here in 1917, serving as student body president in his senior year, despite working much of his way through college.

McKay was one of the few students to begin his college activities as president of the freshman class and later to be chosen for the highest office. Other activities listed under his picture in the Beaver, college yearbook, were student body third vice-president, member of the student council and student executive committee, director and secretary of the student cooperative bookstore, member of the YMCA cabinet and manager of its handbook, class track squad two years and captain of an ROTC company.

Unemployed Now Served In Cave Junction Office

The State Unemployment Compensation Commission has provided a service for residents of the Illinois Valley and recently made arrangements to take claims for unemployment compensation at Cave Junction with office space provided by Linkhart and McLean, at their real estate office.

Due to the large number of unemployed persons who are filing claims, it is necessary that certain times be scheduled for each person to report. It is necessary to report only once every two weeks at this time. Everyone can assist the handling of claims by reporting at their regular scheduled time. However, these persons who become unemployed should contact the commission representative the first Tuesday they are unemployed.

Office hours will be from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. However, no claims will be taken between noon and 1 p.m.
