January 28th, a skit will be presented along with a box of games and favors at the James Boy's Home on the Holland road, by the

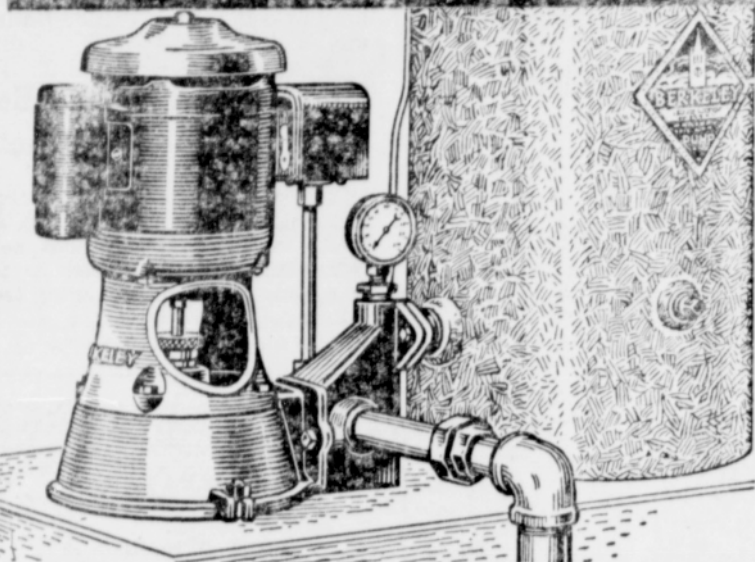
