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WHAT'S IN A NAME?

A rose would smell just sweet if called skunkcabbage. Cave Junction will function just the same if called Cave City, Timbucktoo, or any other name. It would still be the business center of the Illinois Valley regardless.

The only question we are bringing up is-Is it advisable to change the name of Cave Junction when it has such a good start as one of the fine growing little towns in Southern Oregon?

Is it advisable to bring a tremendous fight among its citizens and the patrons of the Cave Junction post office, when we are all now working together for a better water system, better fire department, and for a better town to live in?

Is it advisable to change the name of the town's post office when only a very few of the patrons of the office have a chance to register their approval or disapproval on changing the name? Fully 75 per cent of the patrons of the post office live outside the city's limits and have no voice in the matter. They have no opportunity to say whether they want their post office changed from Cave Junction to Cave City. We know what is going to happen if the city voters elect to change the name of the post office. It is going to make a very "nasty" fight among patrons of the office and the few in the city who want the name changed.

Can the city at this time afford to get entangled in a scrap among citizens of the city and those living outside the city? If the voters in the city realize this we do not believe they would want to jeopardize the future of the community.

Here are a few things that will cause delays and considerable trouble and expense if the city changes its name-Every post office in the United States would have to change the name on the postal department's bulletins. This will cause much delay in mails coming to the city.

Every telephone and telegraph office in the United States and foreign countries would have to change the name, causing delays in long distance telephone service.

Nearly all the road maps have Cave Junction on them. Change the name and all cuts that print the maps would have to be remade. It would take years to have all the maps changed.

Every patron of the Cave Junction post officeif the name of the post office is changed-would have to write to all their friends and to the publications they receive and have the new name put on their list. IV.

We believe the majority of the business men and women in the city do not want the name changed. Unfortunately many of them live outside the city limits and will have no voice in the matter.

If the citizens of the city proper get all the facts about the change, we do not believe they will vote for the change.

As far as this paper is concerned, we do not care what the name of the city is-If the majority of the city's population want the name of Cave City-that's OK by us, but we know there will be a big rumpus among patrons of the post office if the city tries to change the name of the post office, and we are quite vi. sure the post office department will listen to the majority of the patrons of the office.

These are observations of our own. We have been told of the many advantages that would accrue if the name was changed to Cave City. We have tried honestly to weigh the evidence for and against, and have come to the conclusion it is not advisable at this time to change the name of Cave Junction.
