Ashland's Big Shakespearean Festival Aug. 2

Ashland is now preparing for the main event of the year, the annual Oregon Shakespearean Festival. Folks who helped in other events are now repairing the outdoor Elizabethan stage and erecting signs of welcome to theater-goers expected there for the ninth annual drama program.

Ashland is the only community in the country which boasts an operating civil Elizabethan theater organization. While student actors from no less than 10 different states are rehearsing for the August 2 opening, the technical details of the program are being directed by a large corps of volunteer Ashland workers.

Five plays will be produced in repertoire this season so that visitors may see the entire program in five evenings, or at the most, six. "Romeo and Juliet" will open the program, followed by the second of the historical sequence, "Richard II." A troupe of youngsters will assist in the presentation of the fanciful "Midsummer Night's Dream," and a revival of the successful showing of "Othello" will be seen. The program will be completed with "The Taming of the Shrew" which delighted audiences at the San Francisco World Fair in 1939.

Protecting Trees From Rabbits
Rabbits can cause severe damage to trees. A common repellent is lime sulphur. To prepare the material, mix dry lime sulphur in sufficient water to make a thin paint. It can be applied with a brush or rag swab on a stick and it can be sprayed on.
