NEARLY 600 ON JO CO. OLD AGE ROLLS—FOURTH IN STATE

Five hundred and eighty-five (585) persons received Old Age Assistance grants in Josephine County on August 1, 1949. A total of \$29,456.00 was expended for these grants for an average of \$50.35 per recipient. This was the fourth highest of all the counties in the state and contrasts with a state average grant of \$48.41. In July, 586 persons received \$29,509.00 for an average grant of \$50.36 which was again the fourth highest in the state. The state average in July was \$48.32.

Josephine County grants for aid to dependent children were received by 55 families on August 1, 1949 in the total amount of \$4,610.00. This meant an average grant per case of \$83.82 and covered 144 children at an average expenditure per child of \$35.81. In July 58 families received \$5,838.00, an average per case of \$100.66, 148 children were included at an average cost of \$39.45 per child. July state averages were \$106.71 per case and \$42.39 per child.

The significant drop from July to August was the result of a reduction ordered by the state public welfare commission to keep aid to dependent children expenditures within the funds appropriated for this biennium.

In both July and August one grant of \$80.00 was paid to the needy blind in the county. The state average blind payment in July was \$56.20 and \$56.26 in August.

along with any such proposal a new resolution was brought in setting the deadline date at September 15th. This was quickly approved by both House and Senate.

(LAST WEEK'S NEWS LETTER)

The House of Representatives is just about ready to adjourn for this session. Remaining legislation on which is has not acted consists mostly of very large and controversial bills such as the socialized medicine bill and the Brannan farm plan. Such proposals will require weeks of hearings and long and complete debate on the floor of both Houses of Congress.



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There will be plenty of time for full and complete consideration of them next year. There will always be pending before any session of Congress scores of non-controversial and minor bills. This session is no different from any other in that respect, but the House majority leadership properly takes the position that such legislation should be handled next year.

But the fact that the House has completed its work does not mean that Congress can adjourn. The House must sit around and mark time until the Senate is ready to stop talking and get its work done. Our solution to this problem will be to recess but continue in session technically until the Senate is ready to adjourn the session.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture is apparently large enough for one of its bureaus to forget the existence of another. The Forest Service is charged with the task, among other things, of helping stabilize the lumber industry by stimulating new uses for wood products. The Commodity Credit Corporation, in the same department, has charge of the grain storage and price support program.

Accordingly, the lumber industry is still wondering why the CCC, in its first call for bids on storage bins for Midwest corn, prepared specifications which required the use of all steel, thereby precluding the lumber and plywood makers from even a competitive chance at the business.

After strong protests from Congressmen and the industry, the order was amended to include

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wooden bins but suppliers were given only ten days in which to prepare bids and get them to the Nation's Capital.

Incidentally, the CCC prepared its call for steel bins at a time when an industry-wide strike in the steel mills was expected; if that had happened, could the steel bins have been erected by harvest time?

Considerable publicity has been given the passage by the House of a bill to increase the minimum wage law from 40c an hour to 75c an hour. Actually this bill, if it is passed by the Senate and becomes law, will not be of much importance in Oregon so far as the rate

per hour is concerned. People who are employed in our state are either working at much higher hourly rates or are doing work that is not involved in interstate commerce and hence not subject to regulation by Congressional action. What we are mostly concerned with is the fact that the pending legislation serves to clarify and make specific the old "Wages and Hours" law. There has been some doubt as to which businesses are covered under the law and which are exempt. The bill passed by the House clearly spells out the matter of exemptions. I cannot give details of the bill here but will be glad to answer any inquiries or send a copy of the bill to anyone who wants one. 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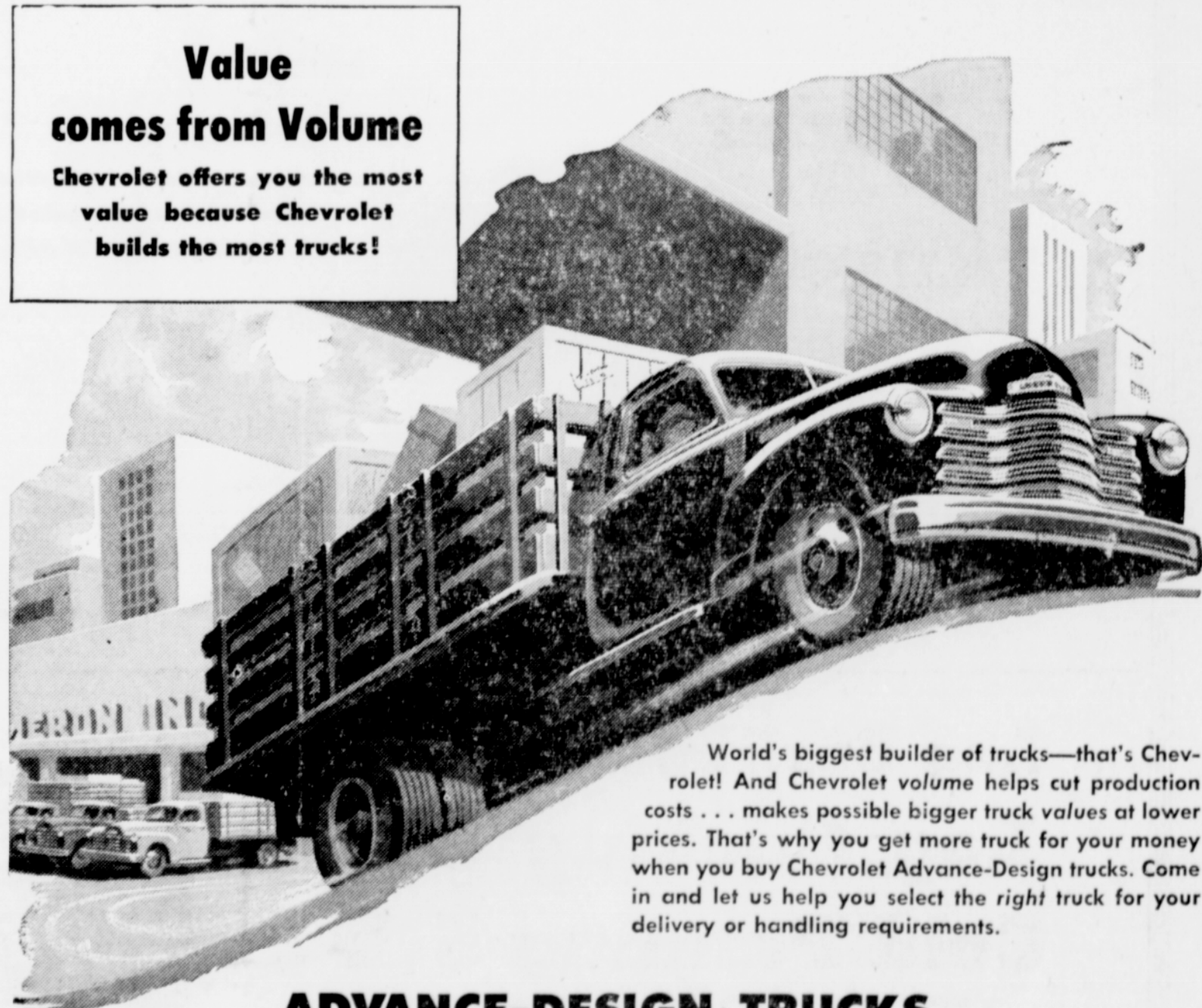
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
