Smelter Has  
Been Ordered  
For Takilma

C. H. Mace, of the Mace Smelter company, Denver, left last Friday for Denver with the order in his pocket to build and construct a smelter for the Waite Minerals, Inc., at Takilma, to be erected on the site of the old smelter that was in operation there years ago.

Major Waite expects to have the smelter in operation by the 15th of January, weather conditions permitting.

W. A. Richelsen, consulting engineer, well known throughout the United States, has just spent several days at the Queen of Bronze and Cowboy mine and left Saturday by plane for Seattle, his home. Mr. Richelsen has been retained as consulting engineer for the Waite Minerals, Inc.

The operations at this group of mines will become a thriving enterprise by the first of the year, and new jobs for some 30 men will be made available, when the smelter is put in operation.

Both Mr. Richelsen and Mr. Mace have made extensive examinations of the copper group and are both enthusiastic on the prospects of extensive development of the copper deposits in this Valley and nearby points.

The use of the smelter will be made available to other miners who can produce copper ore in quantities, and it is a well known fact, that in this territory, enough gold comes in the copper ore to nearly pay the expenses of production, so the outlook for greater production was never brighter.

Important Soil  
Conservation  
Meet Tuesday

A soil conservation meeting is scheduled for next Tuesday evening, October 18th at 8 p. m. in the American Legion hall. It is very important and essential that a good turnout be there for this educational meeting and learn what a soil conservation district can do for the Illinois Valley.

Every person, firm and corporation, state, county or municipal agency being the recorded owner of or holding under contract of purchase, more than 10 acres of land lying within each district is eligible to vote.

Eligible votes who will be absent from their division on the day of the referendum may apply in person or in writing to polling superintendents for absentee ballots, according to the state soil conservation committee.

Voting may also be done with sealed ballots provided by the committee any time up to 8 p. m., next Tuesday, October 25th.

She passed away October 7, at the age of 90 years, 3 months, 2 days at her home on the Oregon Caves highway in Cave Junction where she had resided for the past 55 years.

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon in the Community church, with Rev. George Gray officiating. Interment was in Laurel cemetery, with Hull & Hull Mortuary in charge.
