Oral auction bids will be received by the Regional Forester or his authorized representatives at the office of the Forest Supervisor, Post Office Building, Grants Pass, Oregon, beginning at 2:00 p. m., January 3, 1950, for all the live timber marked or designated for cutting and all merchantable dead timber located on an area embracing about 223 acres within Sections 20, 21, 28, 29 and 30, T. 40 S., R. 7 W., W. M., Elder Creek drainage of the East Fork Illinois River watershed, Siskiyou National Forest, Oregon, estimated to be 6,744,000 feet B. M., more or less, of Douglas-fir; 50,000 feet B. M., more or less, of Port Orford cedar; 343,000 feet B. M., more or less of Sugar Pine; and 59,000 feet B. M., more or less, of white fir and other species of sawtimber. Sealed bids accompanied by the required payment received by the Forest Supervisor prior to 2:00 p. m., January 3, 1950, will be considered the equivalent of an oral bid and posted for the information of all bidders. The appraised value of the timber according to long-term, normal market and operating conditions is \$3.95 per M feet for Douglas-fir; \$9.25 per M feet for Port Orford cedar; \$7.65 per M feet for Sugar Pine, and \$0.50 per M feet for white fir and other species of sawtimber. these rates as a base rate applicable through the entire period of the sale agreement, plus at least \$3.05 per M feet for Douglas-fir; \$5.50 per M feet for Port Orford cedar; \$12.65 per M feet for Sugar Pine, and \$0.50 per M feet for white fir and other species of sawtimber, the total to apply for all timber cut prior to November 30, 1950. On that date and at other times, as stated in the contract, total rates will be redetermined, but in no event will the redetermined stumpage rates be less than the basic appraised value as first above stated, and in no event will rates below those bid be established until at least 3,000,000 feet B. M. have been cut and paid for at not less than the bid rates. In addition to the prices bid for stumpage, a cooperative deposit of \$0.25 per M feet B. M., to be used by the Forest Service for paying the cost of slash disposal, and a cooperative deposit of \$0.55 per M feet B. M., to cover the cost of tree planting, seed sowing and timber stand improvement work on the area cut over, for the total cut of timber under the terms of the agreement, will be required. \$5,000.00 to be applied on the purchase price, refunded, or retained in part as liquidated damages, according to the conditions of sale, must accompany each sealed bid and must be shown to be in the possession of oral bidders as a qualification for auction bidding. If an oral bid is declared to be high at the closing of the auction, the bidder must immediately make the required payment and confirm the bid by submitting it in writing on a Forest Service bid form. The right to reject any and all bids is reserved. Before bids are submitted, full information concerning the timber, the conditions of sale and the submission of bids should be obtained from the Forest Supervisor, Grants Pass, Oregon, or the Regional Forester, Portland, Oregon.

Causes of Slow Milking Determined by Economists

Poorly trained cows were found to be the chief cause of slow milking in a survey of typical New York dairy farms by agricultural economists at Cornell. Another reason is failure of the operator to remove the machine when milking is complete.

Records were taken on 22 farms with herds ranging in size from 11 to 38 cows. Machines were used to milk 87 per cent of the cows. Light was shed on how much time it takes various farmers to do the milking. The range was 3.85 to 8.50 minutes per cow, and the average a little more than 6 minutes.

The average time to milk a cow by hand was about 6.50 minutes. Part of the cows were milked by hand on all but five farms, according to R. G. Murphy of the Cornell staff.

The specialists were particularly interested in why machines were left on cows more than 7 minutes. Prolonged machine stripping was found to be one of the main reasons. In some instances the milking was complete but the operator had not removed the machine. Stripping the cow by hand was the most common job interfering with the removal of the machine.

Shorter milking time for many cows could be attained, the economists concluded, by reducing the machine-stripping time and eliminating or reducing the amount of hand-stripping.

Matches, One-Time Luxury, Now Available to Everyone

Only in the last century have matches been produced in the United States at a cost that makes them available to all, according to national patent council.

Earliest recorded description of fire-making does not go back beyond 4000 B. C. Egyptian hieroglyphs of that time tell of the bow and fire stick.

By 2 A. D. fire was obtained by striking flint and by friction. Even as late as 1847, ten years after Alonzo Phillips was granted the first U. S. patent for phosphorus matches, flint was still in use.

The "ethereal match" appeared in France in 1780. This was a sealed glass tube containing a phosphorus-tipped waxed string. The user broke the tube and the inrush of air caused combustion.

The instantaneous light bottle, consisting of a container of sulphuric acid and splints tipped with potassium chlorate, sugar and gum arabic, was used for 40 years in America and Europe, beginning in 1805. A box of 50 splints cost \$2.

Cost of Common Cold

When the average person comes down with a cold, he stands a good chance of being away from his job for three days, recent surveys show. The cold will probably cost him \$25 in lost earnings and medical expenses. On a national basis, that economic loss is estimated at two billion dollars. It includes one hundred million dollars spent annually for cold remedies and two hundred million dollars spent for vitamins. While \$25 seems like a high price to pay, those who can return to work in three days are actually getting off easy. Many more pay a much higher price. Colds often leave resistance low and the door open for pneumonia, tuberculosis and other severe secondary infections.

Cleaning Tile Floors

Tile floors are attractive and durable when given the good care they need. When it comes to the cleaning, however, there are important points to keep in mind. Tile floors are made of four different kinds of bases—slate, asphalt, bitumen, and resin. Cleaning agents should be selected carefully. Those containing oils, turpentine or carbon tetrachloride should not be used. The first step in cleaning a tile floor is to remove the surface soil. Use a soft brush and do a thorough job. Then apply a mild soap-water solution with a mop or soft cloth, and rinse thoroughly with a mop wrung out of clear lukewarm soft water. Wax may be used as a finishing coat if you desire.

'Don'ts' for Grooming

Do you follow basic principles of good grooming in selecting your wardrobe? Just as a reminder: If you are tall, don't wear vertical stripes or single colors that give you that "long-drink-of-water" look. (And don't slump above the waist!) If you are thin, don't emphasize it by wearing black and drab colors, and don't choose square necklines. If you are short, don't wear wide, colorful belts, bold plaids or vivid prints. If you are stout, don't use square or rounded necklines, shiny finish fabrics, full skirts, puffy sleeves and bosomy ruffles.

Enemies of Stucco

Rain, snow, ice and sleet are natural enemies of stucco. In the winter, rain or snow settles in the cracks in the surface, freezes and enlarges the cracks. As this continues, sooner or later bits of the stucco are forced off and the house becomes unsightly. Proper painting with suitable colors and materials would keep the cracks sealed, the rain, snow and sleet out, and would give character to the house at one and the same time.
