Cold Weather Fires

Statistics show that the Illinois Valley has more house fires during continuous storms than at any other time. It is well to check flues and stove pipes for leaks. Overheated stoves contribute their share of accidents. The presence of oily or paint-stained rags or newspapers in any unventilated place is an extreme fire hazard.

Another factor that contributes to total house destruction during weather such as has prevailed the last 12 days is the difficulty of moving fire fighting equipment fast enough to do any good. There are many different types of chemical and acid fire extinguishers on the market, as well as back-pump water cans that are adequate to stop a small fire. Many of these extinguishers can be purchased for a small amount and should be readily available in every home.

NEWS IN SWEATERS—Colors and Details

NEW YORK—For "beneath-suit" sweaters, colors are the trend. Pale pastels—porcelain blue, baby pink and clear yellow—share honors with the new high-fashion colors—bittersweet, chartreuse and showcard blue. Primarily classic in line, they are snug-fitting and light in weight—comfortable "under-sheathing" for the slim-lined jacket, and rich in novelty detail where the lapel-bordered triangle shows at neckline.

Plunging necklines—often with button trim, and low-cut or "off the shoulder" boat necks are important notes in the 1949 sweaters, worn alone with daytime, cocktail or evening skirts. For a fashionable "dressed up look" with suits, the natural or very high neckline holds top place.

In softest cashmere, fine nubby knit or smooth wool yarn, the year's sweaters have never been lovelier in color or self-contained detail. Ribbing has new fashion significance in almost all new styles. It often extends ten or twelve inches at waistline, four to six at neckline. Turn-back ribbed collars are the perfect foil for tailored costume jewelry, and the wide-flaring "funnel neck" in solid ribbing from breastbone to chin-point adds drama to the most classic tailored suit. Glitter yarn in silver or gold is used lavishly in cocktail sweaters—discreetly in the "beneath suit" sweaters for daytime. Perforation stitching is often designed to simulate jewelry or all-over panelling appears on sweaters of all types—adding '49 glamor to season-favorite classics.

Hawaiian Sweet Potatoes D.



For a delicious dinner that's quick and easy to prepare, a platter of hot pre-cooked ham slices with Hawaiian sweet potatoes is an appetizing treat. Made from beets or wheat, Ac-cent does not add any flavor, color or aroma of its own but instead, intensifies and perks up the good natural flavors of meats, poultry, seafood, vegetables, gravies, sauces and leftovers. Easy to use, it's packed

in red-and-silver canisters, or in red topped glass Ac-cent shaker.

Hawaiian Sweet Potatoes
3 cups sweet potatoes, mashed
2 tbsps. butter or margarine
1/2 tsp. Ac-cent
1 tsp. salt
Pineapple juice
Pineapple rings
Brown sugar

Heat mashed sweet potatoes, add butter, Ac-cent and salt. Well. Add enough pineapple juice to moisten slightly. Arrange pineapple slices in shallow baking pan. Shape sweet potatoes into balls and place on pineapple rings. Sprinkle tops with brown sugar and dot with butter. Bake in moderate oven (375° F.) until hot and lightly browned, 25 to 30 minutes. Makes 6 servings.

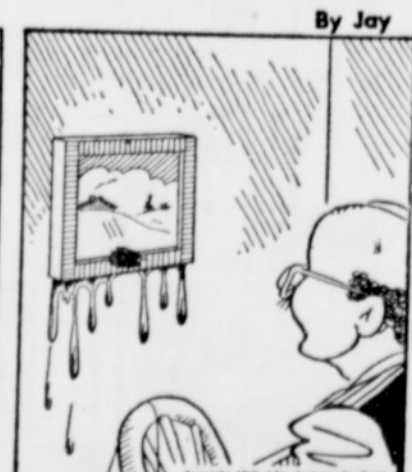
