

Pearson Seeks Democratic Nomination For Governor

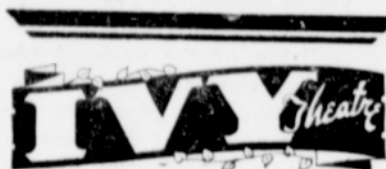


Walter J. Pearson, state treasurer and former member of the legislature, today announced his candidacy for the Democratic nomination for governor in the primary election May 19.

He said he was entering the race in response to urgings by members of both major parties, who realize Oregon voters want a change in their state government.

Pearson, first Democrat to be elected state treasurer since 1886, pledged himself to seek the end of a quarter century of "one-party control whose leadership has been dictated by ultra-conservatives and special interests."

Pearson was elected to the House of Representatives from Multnomah county in 1943 and served in the Senate in 1945 and 1947 before being elected state treasurer. He has consistently supported old-age pensions, labor, the working farmer and small business. He has steadily opposed the sales tax and urged tightening of our present tax laws before adopting any new taxes.

SUNDAY AND MONDAY

"The Barkleys of Broadway" is the answer to the thousands of fans who have never stopped writing appeals that Astaire and Miss Rogers be teamed again. It provides them with a gay romantic story filled with laughs; it gives them seven new song hits from the pen of Harry Warren and Ira Gershwin; it presents them together in five varied dance routines in addition to solo numbers. The musical score is also highlighted by Oscar Levant's playing of the popular Khachaturian "Saber Dance" and Tschai-kowsky's "B Flat Minor Concerto."

Levant heads the supporting cast in the comedy role of the composer who tries to keep peace between two temperamental Broadway stars, enacted by Astaire and Miss Rogers. Also featured are Billie Burke, Broadway actress Gale Robbins and Jacques Francois, a romantic French actor making his American debut in the role of Astaire's rival.

The picture was directed by Charles Walters and produced by Arthur Freed, with the musical numbers staged and directed by Robert Alton, the same combination which gave the screen the highly successful "Easter Parade."

WEDNESDAY AND THURSDAY

"Sealed Verdict" stars Ray Milland with Florence Marly, beautiful Continental newcomer to the American screen. The two

are supported by Broderick Crawford, John Hoyt, John Ridgely and Ludwig Donath, the latter remembered for his wonderful portrayal of Jolson's father in "The Jolson Story."

The story is set in a small German city where several Nazis are being tried for their crimes, chief among them General Steigmann, played by John Hoyt. Prosecuting the arrogant and unrepentant general is Ray Milland as Major Robert Lawson, an able American lawyer who succeeds in winning a conviction, which carries with it a sentence of death.

Far from feeling elated at the outcome of the trial, however, Lawson is beset by doubt as to the accuracy of the testimony of Steigmann's enemies. The doubt is born after a visit from the beautiful French model (Miss Marly), the only one to testify in the General's favor. In spite of himself, Lawson's interest in the lovely woman becomes more and more personal. Under her influence, and at great risk to his career, he re-opens the case, then finds himself up to his neck in trouble and danger as he seeks proof of the general's guilt.

The story not only promises exciting entertainment but it would seem to go further than today's headlines in shedding light on the activities of our boys abroad.

The coming of law and order to the Arizona cattle country is the theme of RKO Radio's outdoor drama, "The Arizona Ranger" with Tim Holt and his father Jack Holt, in the starring roles.

As a two-fisted rancher who favors rough-and-ready methods of treating law-breakers, the elder Holt's role contrasts with his son's portrayal of a Ranger captain who intends to handle matters in a legal fashion. The conflict between the two men, and Tim's misadventures when he tries to capture a clever gang of rustlers, bring about many exciting moments.

Nan Leslie has the feminine lead and Richard Martin, Steve Brodie, Paul Hurst and other well-known players have featured roles. John Rawlins directed.
