Vast new evidences of the power of pure Christianity to solve man-kind's problems in modern times were reported Monday by the Christian Science Board of Directors.

Addressing a gathering of nearly 7,500 Christian Scientists at the annual meeting of the Mother Church, the First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, the directors declared that healing of sickness, "release and enrichment" — a full answer to human trouble — awaits all mankind through the utilizing of spiritual power.

Emphasizing "the meaning of pure Christianity" for the present age, the directors pointed to concrete evidence that spiritual power can be utilized to heal disease, enlarge individual capacity, provide "sure guidance," uncover hidden resources, and provide without measure "the precise good that is needed" by every individual in every human circumstance.

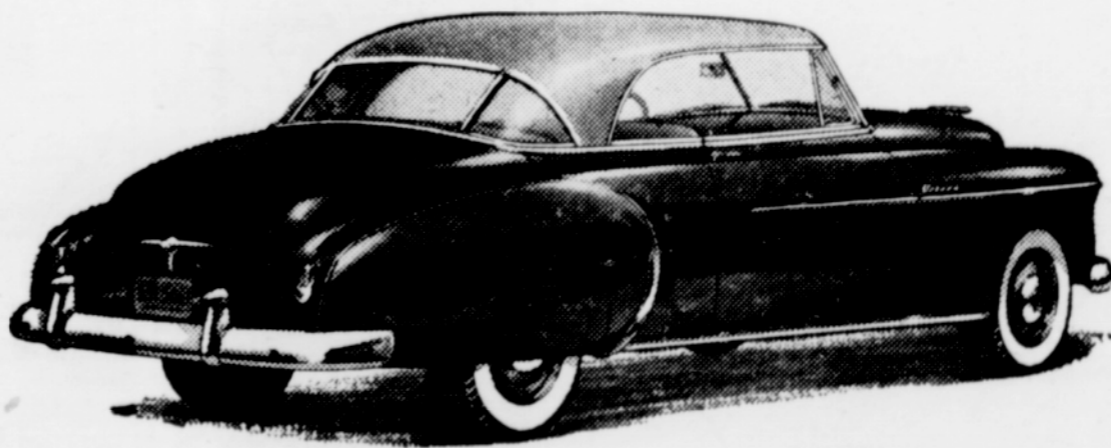
The Veterans of Foreign Wars and their Auxiliary are to hold an auction Saturday June 17 at 1 p. m. at their grounds adjoining the ball park.
