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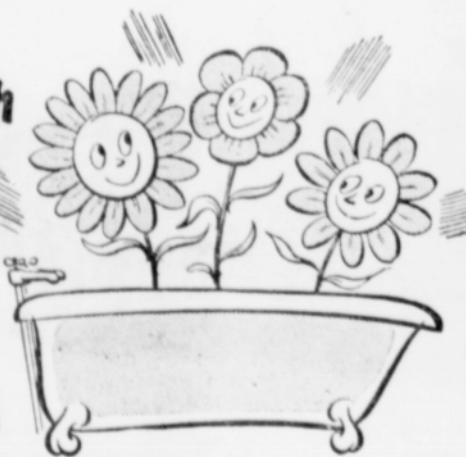

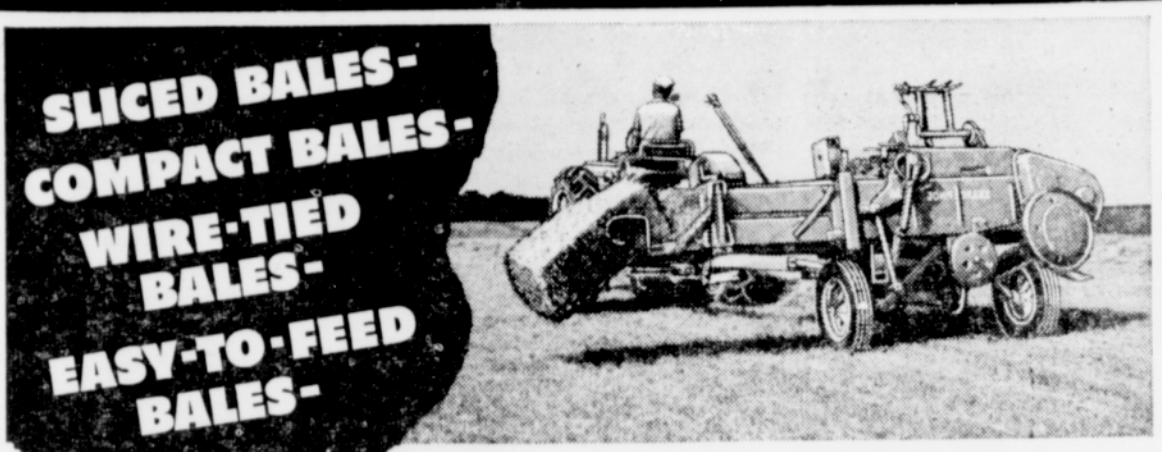

SUKIYAKI

Base-Saki or wine, a little soyu and sugar—when quite hot add onion rings, green onions (cut about 1" long) bamboo shoots (if available), bean sprouts and water cress or frozen spinach. On top of this add more soyu and sugar. Allow to cook until vegetables are just pre-cooked. Then add your meat, cut fine and thin to cook quickly. Cook on top of the vegetable mixture until color changes, then mix in with vegetables and serve. Caution: Do not overcook vegetables. Must be crisp. Serve with rice.

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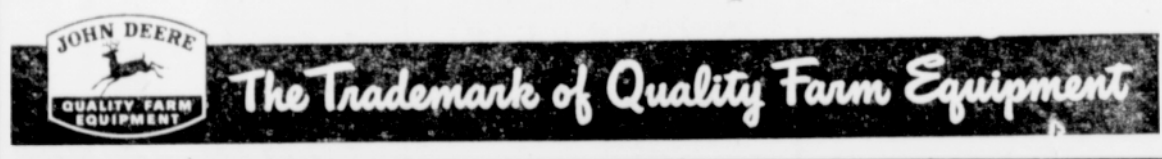
