The annual Adventist camp meeting for Oregon, is to be held at Gladstone Park, Gladstone, Oregon, just outside of Portland, June 22 to July 1. The camp ground covers 73 acres, with 2000 tents and cabins. The week day attendance is expected to be around 6000 with a weekend attendance of from 12,000 to 15,000. The camp meeting traditionally held the third week of July, has been advanced due to the Adventist World Conference to be held in San Francisco in July.

MEAL-TIME MAGIC By Adelaide Kerr

MEAT SANDWICH ROLL

- 2 cupfuls flour
- 4 teaspoonfuls baking-powder
- 1 teaspoonful salt
- 1 1/2 cupfuls chopped cooked meat
- 4 tablespoonfuls shortening
- about 2/3 cupful milk
- 3 tablespoonfuls butter
- Seasoned gravy

Prepare a baking-powder biscuit mixture. Turn out onto a floured board and roll to one-quarter inch in thickness. Spread the dough with the chopped cooked meat which has been seasoned and slightly moistened with gravy. Roll the dough up like a jelly roll. Then with a sharp knife cut it into six or eight pieces as preferred. Place the individual rolls cut side down in a greased pan. Place a small piece of butter on top of each. Bake at 450°F. for fifteen minutes. Serve with brown gravy, tomato sauce or white sauce to which peas have been added. Serves six.

CHICKEN SCRAPPLE

- Carcass of roast or boiled fowl
- 1 teaspoonful salt
- 1/2 teaspoonful pepper
- 1/4 teaspoonful paprika
- 1/4 teaspoonful celery salt
- 1/2 teaspoonful sweet marjoram
- 1/2 teaspoonful thyme
- 1 cupful white corn-meal

Crack up the carcass of a roast or boiled fowl, cover with cold water, and let simmer for several hours. When the liquor is reduced to one quart, strain and add any bits of meat from the bones, cut fine. Add the salt, pepper, paprika, celery salt, sweet marjoram, and thyme. Return to the fire and add the white corn-meal slowly. Cook in a double boiler for one hour. Then pour into a greased, shallow pan to cool. Cut in slices, roll in seasoned flour, and sauté until brown in a little hot fat. Farina or hominy grits may be used in place of the meal. Serves six.

RICE AND MEAT EN CASSEROLE

- 2 teaspoonfuls minced onion
- 1/2 teaspoonful salt
- 1/8 teaspoonful pepper
- 2 cupfuls cooked meat, chopped fine

- 1 egg
- 3/4 cupful stock or hot water
- 1 cupful cooked rice
- 2 tablespoonfuls soft bread-crumbs
- 1 tablespoonful butter

Add the minced onion, salt, and pepper to the cooked meat chopped fine. Then add the egg, well beaten and the stock or hot water. Put a layer of rice in the bottom of a greased casserole, and then a layer of the meat mixture. Cover the top with the bread-crumbs and the butter in bits. Bake at 350°F. for twelve minutes, and serve hot with a medium-thick tomato sauce, made as follows: Melt two tablespoonfuls of fat, add two tablespoonfuls of flour and one teaspoonful of salt. Cook until blended, and then add gradually one and one-half cupfuls of strained, cooked tomatoes. Cook until the mixture thickens; then serve. Serves six.

VEAL IN BROWN SAUCE WITH DUMPLINGS

- 3 tablespoonfuls fat
- 4 tablespoonfuls flour
- 1 teaspoonful salt
- 1/4 teaspoonful pepper
- 1 1/2 cupfuls stock
- 2 cupfuls diced cooked veal
- 1/2 cupful sliced dried mushrooms
- 1 green pepper
- Dumplings

Melt the fat, add the flour, salt and pepper, and stir until well blended. Add the stock and bring to a boil. Slice the mushrooms, which have been soaked in cold water for several hours. Discard the seeds from the pepper and chop it. Add the veal, mushrooms, and green pepper, cover, and cook over a low fire twenty minutes. Serve with steamed dumplings around it. Serves six.

CANNED MEATS

There is an infinite variety of canned and preserved meats on the market that are very delicious and that offer a good selection for the emergency shelf. Potted tongue and other potted meats are particularly good for sandwiches and for after-theatre suppers.

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
