



Brookings, Oregon, holds its fourth annual Lilly Festival on July 2, 3 and 4. The Lilly Parade, the only one of its kind in the world, will be held on July 3. Many are the attractions to entertain the visitor. Besides the parade, the conducted tours through the lily fields and tours to three state parks in the area, will be the fireworks display and the carnival on the Midway.

Given in conjunction with the Lilly Festival will be the annual Flower Show and Art Exhibit by

the Azalea Garden club, opening at 2 p. m. Sunday, July 2, at the high school gymnasium. The Azalea Garden club puts on one of the most outstanding flower shows and art exhibits held in the state.

The exhibit is featuring the works of well-known west coast artists, among them James Kroeter of Portland, Eugene Bennett of Medford, Hal E. Bishop, McConnell, Platz and many others representing Oregon. From Humboldt State college come the works

of Gady, Everett, Stebbins, Williams, Anderson, Knight and McLean.

Photography as art will be an addition this year. Among the most notable contributions are 100 or more works representing the Oregon Camera club. Of special interest will be an exhibit of Ray Atkinson, nationally known free-lance magazine photographer, whose specialty is mountain and snow scenes as well as color photography.

Plymouth Model Plane Contest At Salem Sunday

An air armada of hundreds of miniature planes will descend on Salem next week as model enthusiasts from throughout Oregon gather at Woodburn Airport Sunday, July 2, and Waters Ball Park July 9 to compete in the Oregon Plymouth Model Plane contest.

Activity gets underway at 9 a. m. Sunday when free flight gas and rubber powered planes take to the air. Control line events, including stunt, speed, flying scale and jet are scheduled for 9 a. m. July 9. No admission charge is levied for any of the events, and the public is invited.

According to Elmer Roth, Academy of Model Aeronautics Contest director for the event, a flock of time and speed records may be broken by the kid pilots, with many expected to clock almost 150 miles per hour.

Contestants will be competing for 75 trophies and medals; two all expense paid trips to the Fourth International Model Plane contest to be held later this year in Detroit, and a \$300 university scholarship to be used at a school of the winner's choice.

One of the expense-paid trips will be awarded to a junior contestant, up to 16 years of age; the second to a senior class winner, 16

through 20 years of age. The scholarship will be given to the high point winner less than 18 years of age. Open class contestants, 21 and over, will compete for trophies. All awards are presented by the Plymouth dealers of Oregon, sponsors of the event.

The two Oregon contestants who come out on top of Sunday's competition and qualify for the Detroit trips will vie in August with 500 of the world's best modelers for 127 trophies and \$7,000 in U. S. Savings bonds.
