Favorite Recipe Corner

In our favorite recipe corner we have a casserole dish that Helen Evans of Kerby brought to one of the BPW Potluck dinners. We all enjoyed it and hope you will try it too.

1½ lbs. ground beef
3 tbsp bacon drippings
4 raw potatoes thinly sliced
2 medium sized onions thinly sliced
2 tsp salt
½ tsp black pepper
¼ C minced green pepper
2 tbsp minced parsley
1 can tomato soup
½ can beef bouillon
1 tbsp worcestershire sauce
Brown the meat in the bacon drippings, stirring frequently. Arrange in a casserole in layers, half the meat, half the potatoes, half the onions and seasonings, following with a second layer of each. Pour in carefully the combined soup bouillon and worcestershire sauce. Cover and bake in moderate oven (350 degree F.) about one hour. (Serves 6)
