

Jacksonville "Gold Rush" This Saturday and Sunday

The third annual Jacksonville Gold Rush jubilee sponsored by the Jacksonville Lions club has been set this year for Saturday and Sunday, August 5 and 6. The two-day event will include a round of entertainment open to the public.

August 5 will be Southern Oregon day when dedication of the Jacksonville museum will be held.

Dignitaries invited to attend include Gov. Douglas McKay; Mayor Dorothy McCullough Lee, Portland; Cmdr. A. W. Scott, Pacific Greyhound lines; Frank J. Van Dyke, speaker of house of representatives; William E. Walsh, president of state senate; Ben Hur Lampman, editorial writer, the Oregonian; Marshall Dana, editor, Oregon Journal; Manley Robinson, director of travel information, Oregon State Highway commission; Walter J. Pearson, state treasurer and many others.

The museum, open to the public without charge, contains one of the largest collections of memorabilia pertinent to the settling of the west.

Saturday's festivities will also include a children's parade at 10 a.m. with entries significant to the gold rush era, to be followed by a parade of persons in authentic old-time attire. Crowning of the jubilee queen and introduction of her court will be made that morning. Other Saturday events will be a log bucking contest; a gold rush for children with "finders keepers;" a gold panning contest; tour of miners' village; drill team exhibitions, and street entertainment. Both old time and modern dancing will be featured in Jacksonville halls.

Main event of Saturday evening will be the Jacksonville Historical pageant depicting the settling of this vicinity and discovery of gold on Daisy creek in Rich Gulch in 1851, which for a time made Jacksonville and vicinity the most populated part of Oregon.

Sunday's events will open with church services at 10 a.m. and a talk by Gus Newbury, pioneer speaker, at 11 a.m. The grand parade will be at 1 p.m., Sunday and the big gold rush will take place at 2 p.m. Vials of real gold will be buried in a certain area to be recovered and kept by those who want to enter the contest.

Special events and dancing will only be parts of the days' festivities when the gold rush days in Jacksonville will be revived August 5 and 6.

CHOCOLATE MACAROONS

Combine: 1/2 cup salad oil, 4 squares of bitter chocolate (melted), 2 cups sugar. Beat in 4 eggs, one at a time and add 2 teaspoons vanilla and a little almond extract and two cups flour sifted with 2 teaspoons baking powder. Chill. Make round balls and drop into confectioners sugar. Bake on greased sheet at 375 degrees 12 to 15 minutes. Makes 6 dozen macaroons.
