### N. Y. GIANTS SEARCH FOR OREGON TALENT

Mickey Shader, western scout for the New York Giants National league baseball club, has issued a call for diamond talent to report to a tryout camp in Dallas, Oregon, a little Willamette Valley city, on August 4 and 5.

With Hughie Day, another Giant scout, Shader will look over prospects for the Giants as he conducts the camp "in major league style."

All players eligible to sign professional contracts may attend without charge, although each must pay his own expenses and bring his own uniform. Games will be played both Friday and Saturday, and all players will be allowed to participate.

Shader points out that the camp will be strictly a hunt for talent and is not a baseball school, although much instruction will be given. Sessions will be held rain or shine, and on the concluding day, pick of the prospects will meet a top semi-pro outfit of this area in a nine-inning game.

Shader, in his 39th year in baseball, states that anyone signed to the Giants or any of the 19 farm clubs will have full expenses refunded. Carl Hubbell, director of the farm system for the Giants, considers Oregon a rich field for development of ball players, Shader declares.

### TASK FORCE TO STUDY NORTHWEST RESOURCE

A task force representing the President's Office will be in the Northwest July 24 to August 14 to study federal land management activities. Arrangements for the group's trip are being made by Daniel L. Goldy, regional administrator of the bureau of land management, Portland, Oregon, H. J. Andrews, regional forester, Pacific Northwest region of the forest service, Portland, and C. J. Olsen, regional forester, Intermountain region, forest service, Ogden, Utah. The task force is composed of representatives of the bureau of the budget and of the Departments of Agriculture and Interior. They are to gather information for the executive office of the President concerning the various government bureaus which handle natural resources.

During the three weeks the task force is in the Northwest they will visit many field stations and federal land units. Their chief interest is in the work of the forest service and the bureau of land management, but they will also concern themselves with the activities of other agencies in the two departments, including the bureau of Indian affairs, bureau of reclamation, soil conservation service, fish and wildlife service, bureau of agricultural economics, national park service and the farmers home administration. They do not expect to hold formal hearings but will interview state officials and interested local leaders concerned with natural resources.

It is expected that the findings of this task force will be considered by the President in the action he may take in proposing organizational plans for the federal land management agencies to Congress under the reorganization act of 1949.

The main task force has been split into two working groups. One group is visiting the southern and southwestern states. The one that will come to the Northwest has been in the Lake states and the North Central states. Their tour in this area will begin at Spokane and end at Boise after a trip to include many points in Oregon, Washington and Idaho.

In the group will be William Pincus of the budget bureau, Hugh L. Stewart of the Department of Agriculture and Charles M. Genaux of the Department of Interior. Stewart will be assisted by Charles L. Tebbe, and Pincus by Palmer Smith.

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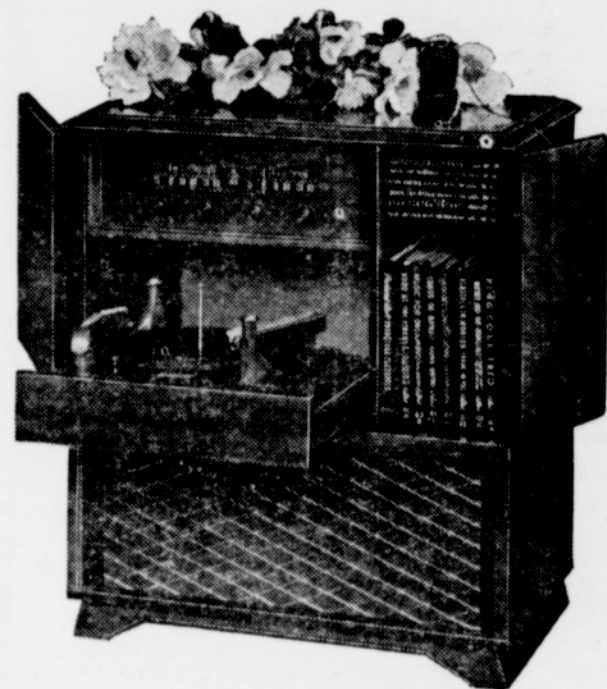
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
