

**Aircraft, Auto Mechanics
Needed, McChord AF Base**

Approximately 1000 civilian employees are being urgently sought to fill existing vacancies at McChord Air Force Base near Tacoma, Washington, according to an announcement today by the McChord civilian personnel office.

Of these vacancies, 600 aircraft specialists in all phases of aircraft maintenance are needed at McChord and 400 auto mechanics covering all fields of automotive maintenance are sought for the Mt. Rainier Ordnance Depot, near the McChord base. The Ordnance Depot also needs trained instrument and artillery repairmen.

Ex-servicemen with any of the needed skills are urged to apply to the nearest State Employment Office for the necessary forms.

Applicants selected will receive indefinite civil service employment and are entitled to such benefits as annual and sick leaves and free government insurance covering injuries. Employees work a 6-day week with time-and-a-half for overtime over 40 hours as well as 10 to 15 per cent extra compensation for night work. Excellent working conditions are offered and present wage scales are higher than ever before.

**State Horseshoe Contest
Scheduled Aug. 30-Sept. 2**

Prizes totaling \$500 will be offered to winners in the annual Oregon State Horseshoe championship tournament which will be held August 30 through September 2 in conjunction with the Clackamas county fair at the fairgrounds in Canby.

Three classes — men, women, and boys 16 years of age and younger—will be featured in the competition. Twenty prizes totaling \$400 will be awarded in the men's class, while the women's and boys' classes will draw \$50 in prizes each. Trophies will be awarded champions of each group.

Contestants in the men's competition will be charged \$2 entrance fees, which will include membership cards in the state and national horseshoe associations. The qualifying round of the men's tournament is scheduled for August 31 and September 1. Each contestant will pitch two series of 50 shoes and will turn in his top score for record. The 20 contestants who score greatest number of points in this round will make up the field which will participate in a round-robin, ending September 2, for the state title.

The boys' tournament will be conducted August 30-31. This event has not been held for a number of years because of the small number of entrants. However, this year the State Horseshoe association, headed by Charles Chapelle, Portland, has indicated that a fair sized field is expected for this event.

The women's championship will be determined September 2. Expected to be on hand for this event is Mrs. Sarah Byers, Portland, who has held the state crown for the last three years.

Southern Pacific News

Plans for buying or building an additional 5000 freight train cars and 46 diesel electric locomotives were announced by President A. T. Mercier of Southern Pacific, following a meeting of the railroad's Board of Directors in Portland.

The new equipment will raise to 28,630 the total number of new freight train cars and 350 the total number of diesel electric locomotives for Southern Pacific since end of World War II, Mercier reported, besides an investment in half the cost of 8000 new Pacific Fruit Express refrigerator cars. It is expected that builders will begin delivering the new equipment in the first half of next year.

Including the foregoing, the railroad's post-war purchases of new rolling equipment have called for an expenditure of more than \$307,000,000, the rail president said.

Of the previous purchases of 23,630 new freight train cars, nearly 21,000 are already in service. Of the approximately 2600 cars remaining, the railroad is now receiving deliveries from builders at the rate of more than 500 cars a month. The latest freight equipment purchase program includes 3500 box cars, 1100 gondolas, 250 covered hopper cars, 100 open hopper cars and 50 cabooses. Consideration will be given to constructing certain of the equipment in the company's own shops, Mercier added.

The company's previous purchases of locomotives include 141 powerful diesel freight and passenger locomotives for main line operations, 117 of which are now in service. The latest locomotive purchase program includes 21 branch line locomotives and 25 switching locomotives. With completion of present orders, Southern Pacific will have 489 diesels of various types, making it one of the few railroads with more than one million horse power of such locomotives, Mercier added.

The company also has acquired new streamlined passenger cars for more than nine complete trains, two in service and seven going into service this month, it was pointed out.

**CIVIL SERVICE EXAMS
TO BE GIVEN IN OREGON**

Announcement was made today by the Oregon State Civil Service Commission that open-competitive examinations in three classes are to be given throughout Oregon soon.

The classes listed for examination are Retail Store Clerk, starting salary \$195; Engineering Aide, starting salary \$200; and Field Auditor, starting salary \$270. From the Retail Store Clerk test, open only to men, will be established a register from which positions in state-owned retail liquor stores will be filled. These positions, as with Engineering Aide and Field Auditor jobs, are located throughout the state.
