Reserve Fleet Groups

Call For Volunteers

To Serve In Northwest

Active duty billets for 58 volunteer Naval Reserve officers and 630 enlisted men have become available in Bremerton, Tacoma and Astoria, Ore. Service would be for a minimum of one year, according to an announcement by Commander, Pacific Reserve Fleet.

In the commissioned and warrant officer categories, volunteers will be accepted who have had experience in electrical engineering, steam and internal combustion engines, navigation, supply and amphibious craft operation.

Enlisted men are required with ratings as gunner's mates, ordnancemen, machinist's mates, electricians mates and disbursing clerks.

In order to facilitate the selection process, officers and men of the Naval Reserve who desire this type of duty may write directly to the Personnel Officer, Pacific Reserve Fleet, Treasure Island, San Francisco. Letters should include an account of education and experience in the specified fields.

"Reserve officers and men who possess the desired qualifications are needed for service with activation teams in the Bremerton, Tacoma and Columbia River groups of the Reserve Fleet," a spokesman for Commander Pacific Reserve Fleet said.

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Navy Defines Procedure For Reserves Requesting Delay In Recall To Duty

Instructions for members of the Naval Reserve requesting delay in recall to active duty have been issued by the Bureau of Naval Personnel.

Naval reservists who consider themselves to be within one or more of the deferment categories or their employers may submit written requests for a temporary delay in recall.

No requests will be considered prior to actual receipt of orders to active duty. Requests must be submitted within 48 hours after receipt of orders.

Reserve officers should address their requests to the Bureau of Naval Personnel, Washington 25, D. C., via the Commandant, Thirteenth Naval District. Enlisted Naval Air Reserves should make their requests to the Chief of Naval Air Reserve Training, Glenview, Illinois. All other enlisted Reserves should submit requests to the Commandant, Thirteenth Naval District, attention Review Board, 1611 West Wheeler St., Seattle 99, Washington.

Reservists whose requests for delay are denied or who have not received a reply to their request prior to the date they are ordered to report, must comply with their orders. After reporting on active duty, they may initiate a request for release to inactive duty.

Deferment categories, established by the Department of Defense, may apply to Naval personnel who are:

(a) Enrolled in educational institutions (depending upon the merits of the individual case, their recall may be delayed until completion of the school term in which they are registered);

(b) Pursuing a professional graduate course or engaged in research in a technical or scientific field of primary interest to the Department of Defense;

(c) Considered extreme hardship cases;

(d) Engaged or employed in certain civilian occupations or essential activities identified as such by the Departments of Labor and Commerce;

(e) Considered key "material" personnel whose call to active duty would cause material loss of production, services or research necessary to the national health, safety or interest.

Army To Take Reserves And New "WAC'S"

Former enlisted members of the Women's Army Corps in the inactive and volunteer enlisted Reserves may, if otherwise qualified, volunteer for active duty to complete a minimum of one year's service, the Department of the Army announced today.

The previous voluntary recall of WAC enlisted reservists was limited to those with special skills. The new policy applies to all WAC reservists not in organized units, regardless of their military occupational specialties.

Women without previous military service may now enlist in the United States Army Reserve and may also volunteer for active duty. Personnel in this category, if found qualified, will be sent to Fort Lee, Virginia for Basic Training before being assigned to a unit in the Army.
