



Seabees Seek More Men In Petty Officer Rates

The Navy's famous "Seabees" have put out the call for construction workers of all trades for the inactive Naval Reserve.

According to the latest announcement from the Reserve "Seabee" Program Officer, experienced tradesmen in the following categories are particularly needed: drivers, construction equipment operators, steelworkers, electricians, carpenters, mechanics, water supply and sewage disposal plant operators, and surveyors.

While veterans of World War II are desired, all men with experience are being sought. To those who qualify, by experience alone, the "Seabees" are offering petty officer rates up to and including chief petty officer in the inactive reserve.

Organized for the first time three weeks after Pearl Harbor, the first Construction Battalions grew to a total of 247,000 officers and men at the peak of the war. Comprised of men experienced in over 50 construction trades, the "Seabees" won fame particularly in the Pacific theatre. Teaming with Marine and Army engineers, they established a new concept of high-speed advanced-base construction, building airfields and port facilities.

ARMED FORCES FORM PRIORITIES COMMITTEE

The Armed Forces in the Seattle-Bremerton area, in cooperation with the State Employment Security Department, have formed a voluntary priorities committee for allocation of available civilian manpower to military installations. The committee will screen requirements for personnel in certain trade skills and clerical work. It will then route prospective employees in conformity with agreed priorities of each requesting armed forces activity.

"Shortages have become evident in certain categories," according to A. W. Burchill, manager of the Seattle office of the State Employment Security Department. "Available manpower in these categories must, therefore, be so allocated as to fill the most pressing needs first."

Mr. Burchill explained that the group will determine priorities as between armed forces installations only. The determinations of the group will not affect the routing of prospective employees to civilian employers.

Mr. Burchill is chairman of the committee, which includes representatives of principal activities of the Armed Forces in the Seattle-Bremerton area.

A similar group has been formed to handle manpower priorities in the Tacoma area. The plan is also being placed in operation in other areas.

The committee will meet at the Headquarters, Commandant Thirteenth Naval District, at 9:00 a.m., Tuesday, August 22.

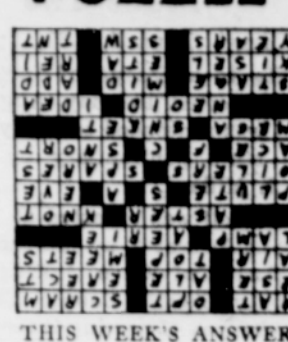
