Employment in County Still Rising in August

Employment in Josephine county continued to rise during August despite the high level established earlier in the summer. The demand for additional workers in lumber and logging continued strong and at times exceeded the supply in both semi-skilled and unskilled categories. Although the shortage of freight cars for lumber shipping has not yet resulted in mass lay-offs, the situation has caused shortened working hours and consequent decrease in the workers' pay at several plants.

Selective Service and Higher Education

Young men who find themselves in a quandary over enrolling at college or waiting to be drafted may find worthwhile counsel in comments made this week by state educators.

Executive officers of the Oregon state system of higher education have received numerous inquiries seeking selective service information from men who are college age. In answering the inquiries, these educators have related many World War II examples when men delayed entering school awaiting service calls only to learn the calls did not come, or that they were rejected after reporting for physicals.

With that in mind, encouragement has been voiced to young men to attend college right up to the time of induction. "Whatever the role a young man is destined to play, chances are his college background and experiences will make him more valuable to his employer—civilian or military," Chancellor Paul C. Packer declared.

As for selective service regulations for students, the state board of higher education has received the following statement from Gen. Louis B. Hershey's headquarters:

Students who receive their initial call for induction while enrolled full-time in a college or university, will, by law, have their induction postponed to the end of the academic year.

Deferment of students, both undergraduate and graduate, who receive their notice for induction prior to the beginning of this academic year, has been authorized by national headquarters of selective service if:

1. They have completed at least one academic year.
2. They were in the upper half of their class during the last academic year enrolled.
3. They had made arrangements prior to August 1, 1950, to enroll in a full-time course of instruction at a college or university or similar institution of learning for the academic year ending in the spring of 1951.

Military reserve officer units are operating at both the University of Oregon and Oregon State college. The university has an Army and Air Force program. Oregon State has Army, Air Force and a Navy officer program.

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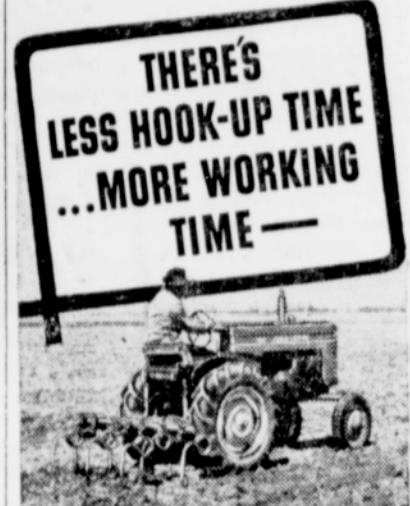
