Mrs. Grant Carothers is able to be out again after a session with a cold which left her with a nice husky voice, but could not rid her of her smile.

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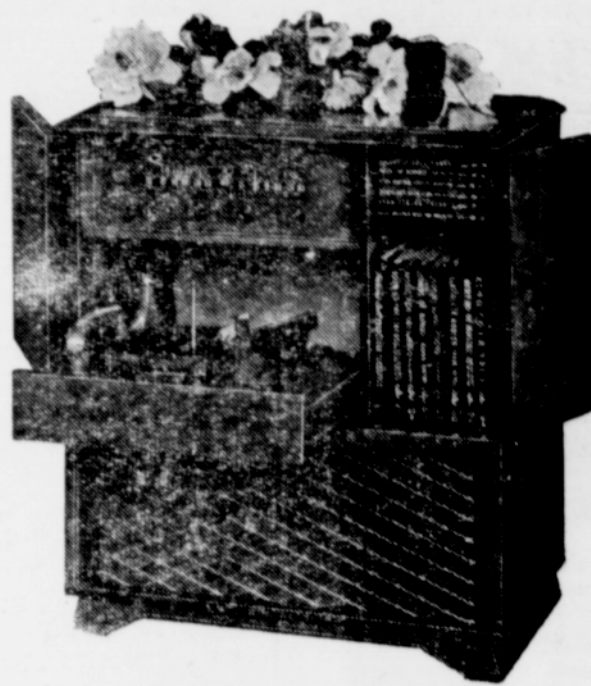
