Navy Will Hold Tests For College Training

The annual competitive tests to select approximately 1600 applicants for the Naval Reserve Officers' Training Corps college program will be held in 550 cities in the United States and its territories on December 9, 1950.

All male high school seniors and graduates between the ages of 17 and 21 are eligible to apply for the program, under which the successful candidates are given a four-year college education at government expense at one of the 52 colleges and universities throughout the country having NROTC units. To qualify, applicants must meet physical and mental standards and successfully pass an aptitude test.

Application blanks and complete information are available from high school principals, college deans, professors of naval science, offices of naval officer procurement, and naval recruiting offices throughout the country.

Students enrolled in the program will be deferred from induction under the Selective Service Act pending completion of their academic course. They must agree to serve on active duty for two years when graduated and commissioned.
