Car Situation Better, Says Southern Pacific

In spite of a country-wide shortage of freight cars—the most severe in many years—Southern Pacific has established an all-time high in the first eight months of 1950 for the movement of freight shipments to and from Oregon, according to W. W. Hale, vice president in charge of operations for Southern Pacific. Mr. Hale is in Portland with J. W. Corbett, vice president in charge of operations for Southern Pacific, to give personal attention to transportation problems in Oregon.

Up to September 1, the tremendous total of 150,915 loaded cars had been shipped from Oregon points on the railroad's Portland division, the rail vice president

said, whereas less than 50,000 loaded cars were hauled into the territory.

Because of the great disparity between Oregon's loaded inbound and outbound traffic, Mr. Hale pointed out, Southern Pacific has brought close to 100,000 empty freight cars onto the Portland division in 1950 in order to give Oregon shippers their full share of available equipment.

Forest products, forming the great bulk of Oregon's outbound shipments, have accounted for 78 per cent of all freight movements on Southern Pacific rails from this state, it was revealed. Records for the first eight months of 1950 show that the company hauled 118,175 carloads of lumber and other products of forestry from Oregon mills—more than ever before in any comparable period.

"As the center of the lumber industry, and possessor of the nation's greatest remaining stand of timber, Oregon has seen its forestry output skyrocket to great heights in the last few years, to the great profit of lumbermen and the improvement of the state's economy at large," Mr. Hale said. "The number of mills on Southern Pacific's lines in this state has increased from 358 in 1941 to more than 700 in 1950."

Attention was also called to the fact that Southern Pacific has substantially increased its ownership of freight cars. Since the end of the war, the company's purchases have amounted to 28,630 freight cars, along with 350 diesel locomotives. More than 21,000 of the new freight cars are now in service, and of those remaining on order, about 500 are being delivered each month. The company's outlay for new rolling stock alone since V-J day now totals more than \$316,000,000, including half the cost of more than 11,000 new refrigerator cars.

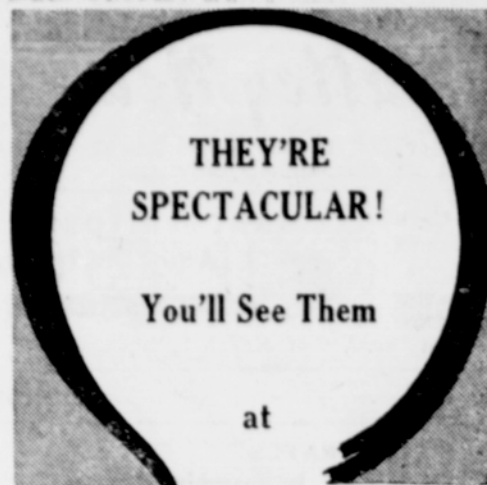
