The City of Cave Junction is beginning to look more like it every day; a city, that is. First, courtesy of the state highway department, we got a four lane street paved through town—narrow lanes perhaps, but four just the same. Unfortunately the department could not see its way clear to pave the edge of the right-of-way or even over to the power and telephone lines, as requested by the city, but at least the street shows considerable improvement.

Several groups of merchants and property owners then got together and hired the highway contractor to pave from the edge of the street back to the curb line, giving the city a definitely metropolitan air and solving the snow, water and mud problem which arises every winter. It was unfortunate that the contractor did not give more publicity to this phase of his activities, since many businessmen and property owners expressed a desire to have paving done too late to secure his services.

The highway department did itself proud on the stretch between the state line and Cave Junction, but the Caves highway didn't receive so much as a pat on the head, and there are stretches of 199, particularly between Kerby and Selma, where the roadbed has broken down completely. Little time remains for any significant repairs to be made on these sectors, and it must be presumed that Valley industry will again face the same hauling restrictions which were imposed last winter.

U. S. National Leads State in Deposits

The deposit figure reported by the United States National bank of Portland in response to a call issued by the comptroller of the currency on October 4, was the third largest ever recorded in the history of that institution.

United States National continued to lead in the state-wide deposits with \$571,080,892, a gain of \$47,224,104 since the June 30, 1950 call. This figure has been exceeded only by two calls which came during the height of war and post-war activity. According to Robt. Neilson, Jr., manager, deposits for the Grants Pass branch now stand at \$8,318,406.

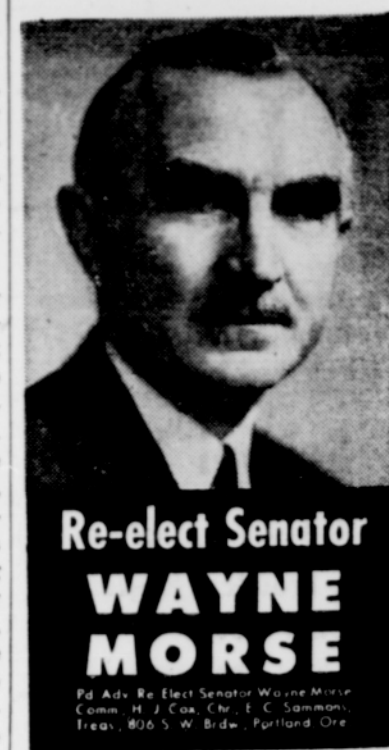
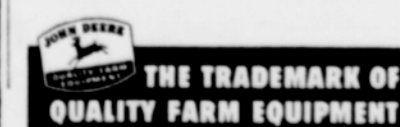
