IDEALS IN PLACE OF GUNS

The "Good Neighbor" relationship existing between the United States and South America should be used as a pattern for world peace," Roberto M. Hooker of the Pacific University faculty told 1000 banqueters assembled by the Junior Chamber of Commerce in Salem Tuesday.

The Nicaraguan speaker said the Monroe doctrine solidified the Americas into a friendship pact. He theorized that to combat communism, Americans should send more ideals and less guns abroad. The speaker said the younger men of America should be congratulated for living in this the greatest moment of history, although they face a disturbed future and possible military service.

DELETE NON VOTERS

The renovation of county registration lists was underway in most counties of the state this week.

The names of all persons will be removed from the eligible voters lists who have not voted within the past two years, along with any whom the election boards have noted as deceased.

All persons whose names have been removed will be sent notices. If they reside in the same precinct they may be reinstated by returning a card. If they have moved to another address in the precinct they may be reinstated by writing the new address on the card. If they are in a different precinct, they must re-register to get back on the voting lists.

Early checking shows 25 per cent of non voters have been removed.

PLAN STATE CAR POOL

A plan for establishing a pool program involving the use of state-owned cars is on the drawing boards of the state highway department. A preliminary draft is being considered by the state board of control.

The misuse and the lack of planned use of the state's rolling stock has been the cause of a great deal of bickering by state departments and the personnel of departments; all adding up to a considerable unnecessary expense for the state. More than one plan has failed.

The highway department proposal includes the construction of a garage to cost \$210,000.

WIELD BIG PEAVEY

Members of the Associated Forest Industries of Oregon are peeved over willful log truck overloading being practiced by some

members and contractors working for them.

Resolutions were adopted condemning the practice and accelerating the association's campaign to reduce the number of violations of the state law on overloads.

A committee was appointed to work with the accident prevention division of the state industrial accident commission to propose legislation banning unsafe logging equipment.

TESTS FOR DELINQUENTS

Psychological and educational examinations for delinquent children will be provided in a bill the state board of control is preparing to present to the 1951 legislature.

The purpose of the examinations will be to enable the judge to decide whether the child should be sent to the state training school or a state hospital. The 1949 legislature failed to act on a similar bill when it was introduced.

JOB INSURANCE PICTURE

An analysis of Oregon's average claimant for unemployment insurance during the last benefit year has been drawn and will be presented to the 1951 legislature as a basis for deliberation of any revisions of the benefit laws.

The average benefit case was that of a man 41 years old, a semi-skilled worker, earning \$2044 in the woods products or similar industry and who was entitled to \$22.57 compensation a week for 20.2 weeks but who actually drew less than 11 checks while out of work.

LIMIT ON PAY RAISE

The \$10 a month across-the-board salary increase will be restricted to state employees who receive \$400 or less a month by an order made last week by Governor Douglas McKay. This conforms with the state emergency board's action on salaries of employees of the board of higher education.

SHORTCUT REPORTS

Reports of automobile accidents may now be made at the field offices of the state motor vehicle department, Secretary of State Earl T. Newbry announced Friday.

Newbry has instructed the personnel of the field offices to assist motorists making out reports and explain the requirements of the state financial responsibility law. Reports may be filed by motorists involved in accidents at the field offices between 9 a. m. and 5 p. m. Monday through Friday and between 9 a. m. and 1 p. m. on Saturdays.

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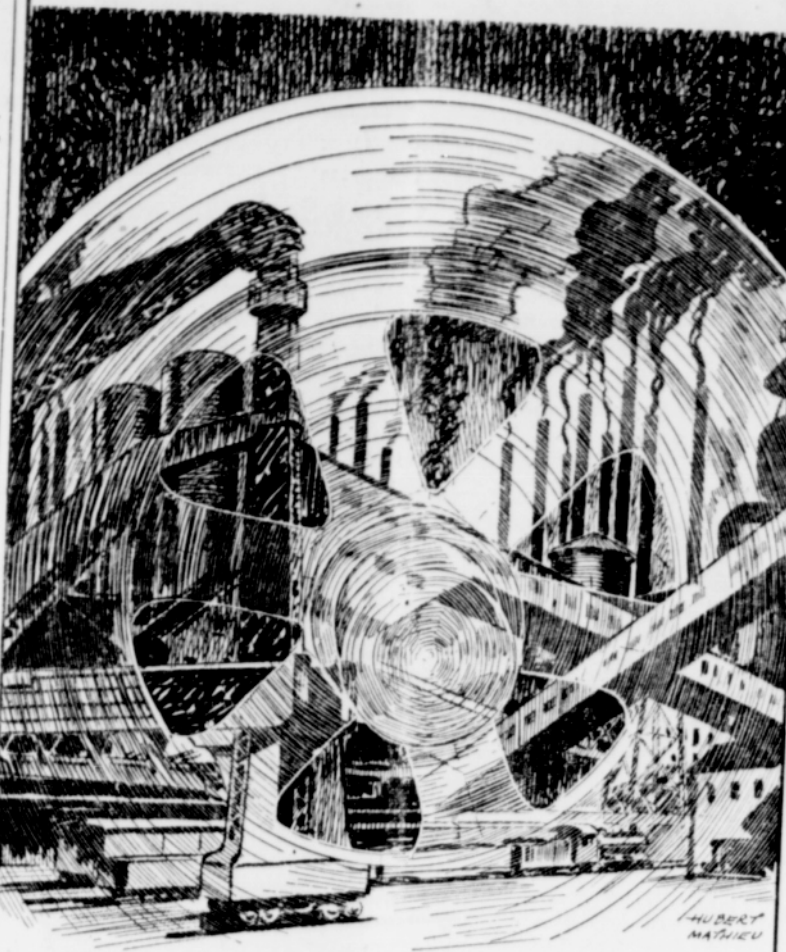

Do Tonsils Have a Dollar Value?

A businessman went to a surgeon for a nose operation. While he was under anesthesia, the doctor decided that the man's tonsils were in bad shape—and removed them. Later the man sued the surgeon for removing the tonsils without permission. The doctor argued that, even though he may have been hasty, no harm had been done



because tonsils weren't worth anything anyhow! However, the court sustained a jury verdict of \$2,000. The jury said: "The law presumes that every organ in the human body has some function to perform—even though medical science has not ascertained it."

Is it "Negligence" to Throw Free Candy into a Crowd at a Parade?

A group of business firms staged a parade as an advertising stunt. One company, makers of candy, had a bright idea. The queen of its float was given a big box of candy kisses, and these she scattered along the line of march. Youngsters began to swarm around this float, and a mad scramble developed after each toss. At one point, the queen threw a handful of the morsels into the crowd along the curb. In the rush that followed, an elderly man was knocked over and suffered assorted bruises. He later sued the candy company for damages. The company protested that the injury had been inflicted by the children—not by the candy! But the court held the company responsible anyhow. The judge said it was obvious that throwing candy under such boisterous circumstances was only too likely to cause trouble.

Are You a "Trespasser"—If You Enter Someone's Property by Mistake?

Motoring at night on a dark country road, a man took a wrong turn and drove out onto a dock. Thinking it was a bridge, he kept going—until he plunged off the end, right into the water. Luckily, he managed to break a car window and swim to safety. He later brought



a damage suit against the dock owner, blaming him for not putting up some kind of warning signal. However, the court rejected the motorist's claim, on the ground that he had "trespassed" on the dock. The judge said that, although the man had driven onto the dock by mistake, he was still technically a trespasser—and thus had no kick coming.

Is One Partner to Blame if the Other One Shoots Somebody?

Two men owned a 5-and-10-cent store. After the store had been robbed twice, one of the men decided to take drastic action. Without consulting his partner, he got a pistol, went to the store late one night and hid behind a pillar. Soon after, a passerby thought he saw a flash light in the store. Suspecting burglars, he walked up and shook the front door knob. Promptly the man inside fired, hitting the passerby in the leg. The victim later brought a damage suit against both partners, claiming that they were jointly responsible for the mishap. However, the court ruled that only the shooter could be held liable. The judge said the second partner was not responsible for the first one's hot-headed action—because it was "outside the scope of the partnership."

May a Careless Driver Collect Damages if Hurt in an Accident?

Speeding along a country road, a motorist swung out to pass the car ahead—driven by a woman. Despite his honking, the woman did not slow down at all. In a sudden rage, the man cut in sharply—and a little too soon. The two cars tangled and both of them skidded into a ditch. Despite the woman's carelessness, the court granted her claim.
