7th Day Adventists Select New School Site

"A new Seventh Day Adventist high school site serving southern and central Oregon has just been purchased by the Adventist denomination," announced Elder J. H. Apigian today on his return from Canyonville where the proposed new institution is to be located.

The Adventist church of Oregon which operates 65 grade schools and 4 high schools does not have at present an adequate plant for the high school grades in the southern part of the state. The new proposed school will be located on the 450 acre "Lazy Bar-S" ranch, 17 miles southeast of Canyonville near the Milo postoffice on the south Umpqua river.

Representing the Cave Junction Seventh Day Adventist church at the meeting held November 14 on the proposed site were the following members besides Pastor Apigian: Mr. and Mrs. Walter Chapman and Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Falkenhayn. Elder Biggs, state president of the Adventist conference, Elder George Belleau, state education superintendent of the church, Elder J. T. Porter, educational superintendent of the north Pacific union of the church and Professor L. R. Rasmussen of Washington, D. C., representing the World conference, were present together with 120 representatives of the southern Oregon churches.

The new academy site will also be used by the 13,000 members of the Oregon churches as a youth and junior camp during the summer months.

Christian Science Churches

"SOUL and Body" was the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, November 19.

The Golden Text was, "The Lord God is a sun and shield: the Lord will give grace and glory: no good thing will he withhold from them that walk uprightly" (Ps. 84:11).

Parents Of Deceased PWs Now Entitled To Payments

Parents of deceased World War II prisoners of war who qualify as survivors no longer have to prove dependency in order to receive payments under the war claims act, the Oregon Department of Veterans Affairs reported this week.

Congress has passed a bill removing the dependency clause for surviving parents from section 6 of the war claims act. This action clears the way for the war claims commission to pay parents of deceased prisoners of war who meet all other requirements of eligibility under the act but who could not or would not prove dependency.

The war claims commission says it "has reason to believe that not all survivors of prisoners of war or civilian internees are aware of their rights under the war claims act."

"Widows, dependent husbands, and children of deceased prisoners of war or civilian internees may file survivors' claims. If the deceased prisoner of war left no widow, dependent husband or children, the parents should file."

Eligibility is not affected by whether the deceased military prisoner or civilian internee died in prison or since liberation. Further, widows who have married again are still eligible.

Deadline for filing for these benefits is March 1, 1951. Armed forces prisoners of war or their survivors receive \$1 a day for each day of captivity, and civilian internees or their survivors or their survivors receive \$60 for each month of internment.

Of 118,418 claims received to date by the war claims commission, 16,815 had been paid on October 1, of which 15,834 were to war prisoners or their survivors and the remainder to civilian internee claimants. Payments totaled \$10,977,466.

Claim forms may be obtained from the Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs, State Library building, Salem, or from the county service officers, veterans' organizations and VA contact offices.

BREAD STUFFING

4 cupfuls medium coarse bread-crumbs
1 cupful boiling water
1 egg
½ cupful melted fat
1 small onion, finely minced
1 teaspoonful finely minced parsley

As a first step, prepare the medium coarse bread-crumbs. Bread which is at least one or two days old is most suitable for this purpose. Place the measured crumbs in a mixing bowl and pour over them one cupful of boiling water or enough to moisten them well and set aside to soak from twenty to thirty minutes. At the end of that time, carefully squeeze all excess moisture from the crumbs, leaving them light, yet slightly moist. Then add the egg, beaten lightly, together with the melted fat. Have ready the onion finely minced and the finely minced fresh parsley and combine with the bread-crumbs mixture. One cupful of chopped celery may be added if desired. This quantity is sufficient for a six-pound bird.

MASHED POTATO STUFFING

2 cupfuls rice potatoes
3 small onions
2 tablespoonfuls chopped salt pork
½ teaspoonful marjoram
1 teaspoonful salt
¼ teaspoonful white pepper
¼ teaspoonful paprika
Few grains cayenne pepper
1 tablespoonful chopped parsley or
1 teaspoonful dried parsley
1 tablespoonful melted fat

Pare potatoes and cook them until tender in salted water. To two cupfuls of rice potatoes, add onions which have been chopped and cooked with chopped salt pork, marjoram, salt, white pepper, paprika, cayenne pepper, chopped parsley or dried parsley and melted fat, in the quantity given above. Mix all well together. This stuffing is especially good in chicken but can be used in any variety of poultry. It is sufficient for a five-pound bird.

FISH FINNAN HADDIE AND SPAGHETTI

½ pound spaghetti
¼ cupful butter, fat or oil
4 tablespoonfuls salt

1½ teaspoonfuls salt
1/3 cupful pimientos
2 cupfuls cooked finnan haddie
1 tablespoonful chopped onion
2 cupfuls milk
½ teaspoonful paprika
2 tablespoonfuls grated cheese

Cook the spaghetti and line thickly the bottom and sides of a greased baking-dish. Cook together for five minutes the fat and onion. Add the flour and stir until well blended; then add the milk, salt, and paprika. When the mixture thickens, add the flaked fish and the pimientos cut into strips. Pour the fish mixture over the spaghetti and bake at 500°F. for five minutes; then sprinkle the cheese over the top and replace it in the oven until the cheese is melted. Serves six.

FROGS' LEGS, BROILED

Frogs' legs
Butter, fat, or oil
Salt
Pepper
Butter sauce

Select large frogs' legs. After they have been dressed wash them, dry between towels, and pass the joint of one leg through the muscle of the other, thus holding them in good shape. Brush them over with the fat, dust lightly with salt and pepper and broil till a delicate brown and tender. Serve with a butter sauce.

FISH PIE

2 cupfuls flaked, cooked fish
3 cupfuls mashed potatoes
1½ cupfuls medium white sauce
2 tablespoonfuls minced parsley
1 cupful grated cheese

Grease a baking-dish and line it with mashed potatoes, allowing the potatoes to come about one-half inch above the dish on sides. Put in a layer of fish which has been broken into small pieces, then a layer of white sauce with parsley thoroughly mixed in, and then half of the cheese, another layer of fish and white sauce, finishing with the cheese. Bake at 425°F. for twenty minutes, or until the cheese is brown. Leftover fish of all kinds can be used in this recipe. Serves six.
