Friday and Saturday—

Still on its premiere run in Oregon, "Rogue River" will be seen on two evenings and one Saturday matinee performance this week. This exceptional picture will conclude the matinee performances at the theater for the season.

Full of action and suspense, the picture has as its locale the beautiful Rogue river valley which was filmed in Technicolor in order to do justice to this scenic area.

Stars of this unusually fine motion picture are Rory Calhoun and Jane Liddell.

Sunday, Monday and Tuesday—

When Walt Disney planned his widely-discussed magical musical all cartoon feature, "Cinderella," in color, he aimed for pronounced adult appeal in addition to its all-over family appeal.

His treatment of the famous fairy tale embraces continuous dynamic action and a colorful grouping of scenes ranging from the Royal ball to the cute sequence in which girl mice shoo boy mice out of Cinderella's bedroom so that the girl mice and the birds can help Cinderella with her morning bath.

Romance is deftly incorporated in the whole production. In the past Disney has avoided stressing romantic scenes in his pictures. But now he has permitted Prince Charming to exchange a honeymoon kiss with Cinderella, one that is as fervent and warm as any enjoyed by any romantic couple on the screen. Humor also runs riot in "Cinderella." One of the laugh highlights is the sequence in which Jaq and Gus, the mice, outwit Lucifer, the cat, to obtain trimmings for a dress for Cinderella.

Suspense is built up when the birds and mice unite to thwart Lucifer and effect the release of Cinderella from the tower room in which she has been locked by the stepmother to keep her from Prince Charming.

Wednesday and Thursday—

The sparkling production, "Love Happy" coming this week to the Ivy Theater, boasts a cast of 12 top names in show business.

In top starring roles are the highly charged Marx brothers, Groucho the detective, Chico the piano player, and Harpo the mute, whose big brown eyes speak more eloquently than words and whose exploits on the harp tear at the heart-strings.

Also starring in the film are three gorgeous blondes—Ilona Massey, as a slinky vampire; Marion Hutton, sister of Betty as the leading lady of a musical show, and the dainty little dancer, Vera-Ellen, playing a straight role for the first time in films, instead of giving forth with her unusual dance specialties.

Featured in this laugh-packed film are two purveyors of suave comedy whose names add lustre to any cast, Melville Cooper and Eric Blore, as well as Leon Belasco, the famous continental comic, Raymond Burr, the "heavy" who has taken the late Laird Cregar's place in the hearts of the fans, Paul Valentine, the celebrated ballet dancer and screen player, and Bruce Gordon, the well-known Broadway actor.

is invited to meet with us at a joint installation of officers. All members are urged to stand behind the organization and come to this meeting.

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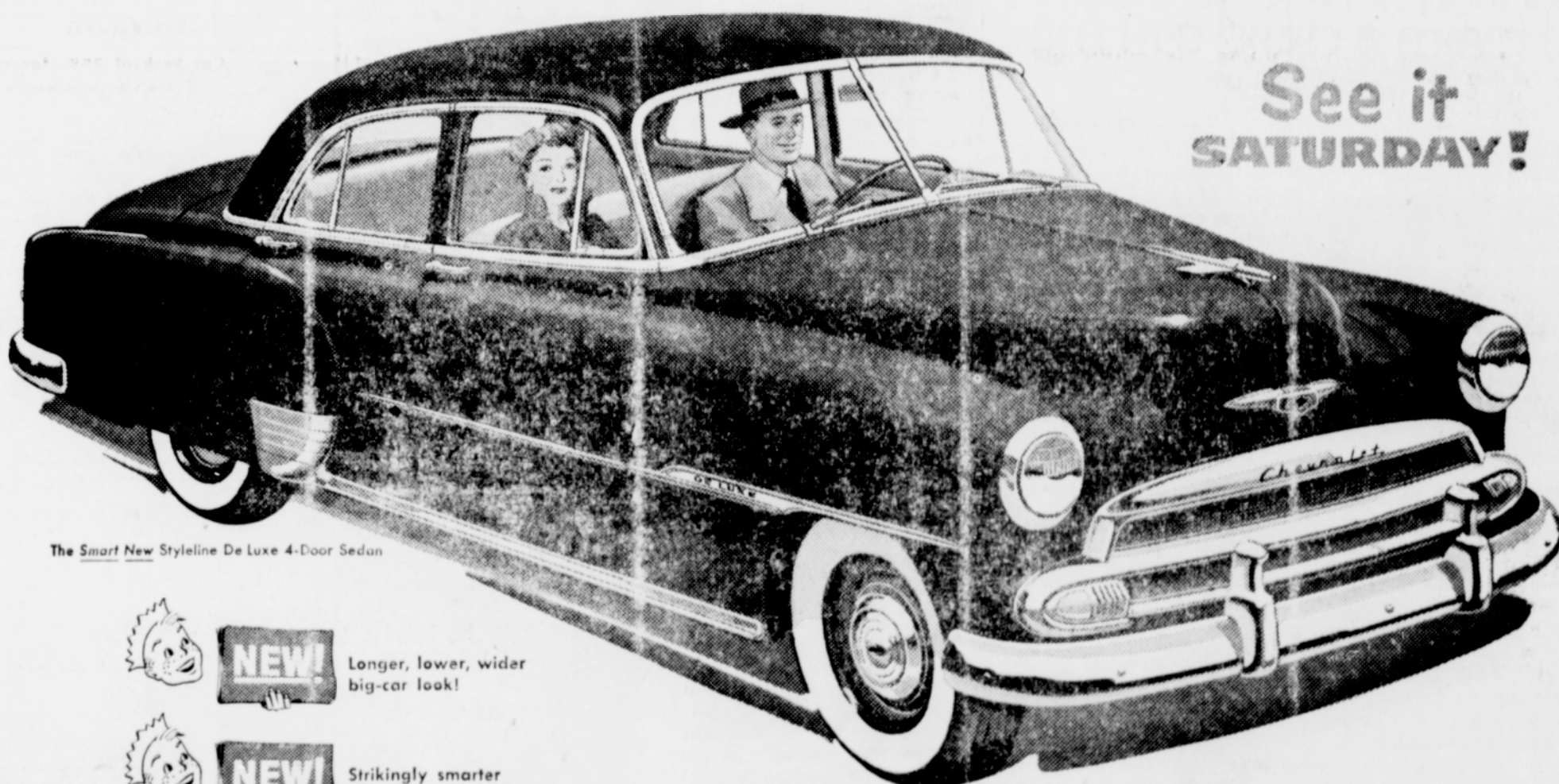
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
