Annual Christian Science Meeting Held In Boston

Complete defense from disaster and destruction is immediately available to every individual and nation through spiritual understanding of God, the Christian Science board of directors declared this week.

Taking note of the world crisis, they affirmed that the deepest laws of the universe are spiritual laws of harmony — and can be utilized for individual protection and preservation of human freedom.

Their special message was read at the annual meeting of the Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, to nearly 7500 Christian Scientists assembled from all over the world.

Church members from all over the world — Japan, New Zealand, Sweden, and other distant countries, as well as Canada and the United States — came to Boston for the meeting, which has been held annually for more than half a century. Smaller meetings on specialized subjects convene on days following the main session.

In their message the directors called for spiritual courage in meeting critical global problems. They said Christian righteousness has never been defeated, and forecast "great spiritual progress" ahead.

New President of the Mother Church for the coming year, it was announced, is Mrs. Lora C. Rathvon of Boston. In a ringing address Mrs. Rathvon said that never was the need more urgent to look beyond the material sense of life, to "see man as God's spiritual idea." Forecasting greater spiritual achievements, she said "We are standing on the brink of a new era."

This theme was emphasized also by Walter S. Cross of Fitchburg, Mass., retiring president, who said the world is undergoing "the most profound and stirring revolution of all time."

"Materialism is being overturned. A profound ferment is at work," he said. He spoke of an open-minded, inquiring attitude in human thought toward religion "which presages a new era in Christianity."

Key officials delivered progress reports on world-wide activities of the Christian Science church. The crowds attending the meeting overflowed the main edifice of the Mother Church, which seats nearly 5,000, to a smaller auditorium and also a nearby theater building.

Healings of cancer, lameness, deafness and blindness through spiritual means, were reported by the Christian Science board of lectureship in a report read by Adair Hickman of New York. Mr. Hickman also reported the return of Christian Science lectures to the Orient after a war-enforced lapse of 11 years.

George Channing, manager of Christian Science committees on publication, reported new progress in gaining legal recognition of the concept that the right of religious freedom includes the right to seek physical healing, in good faith, by spiritual means.

Noting the growing public interest in religion, Horace J. Carver, publishers' agent, disclosed that sale of the writings of Mary Baker Eddy, discoverer and founder of Christian Science, today are double what they were ten years ago.

John H. Hoagland, manager of the Christian Science Publishing society, reported that all-time peaks had been touched during the year in advertising linage and circulation of the Christian Science Monitor.

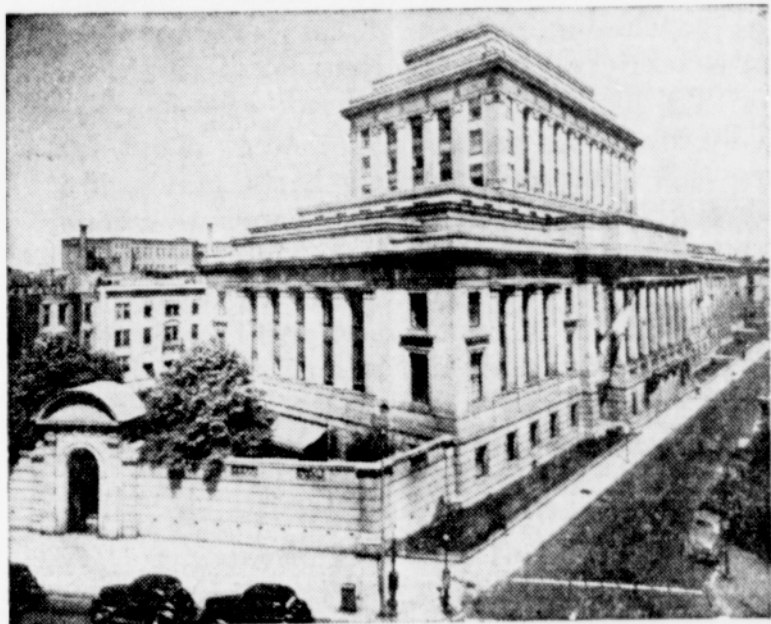
Christian Science Churches
