INITIATIVES AND REFERENDUMS

A long ballot for the 1952 general election, now less than 17 months away, is in the political incubator.

Eight filings of petitions have been made with the state department of elections and signature seekers are again abroad in the land. Four of the petitions are initiatives. Circulators must obtain the signatures of 8 percent of the voters at the last election by July 3, 1952, to get these measures on the ballot. The percentage is based on the vote cast for justices of the supreme court at the last election.

The initiative measures would ask the voters to make barbering illegal on Monday; prohibit fishing on the Columbia river between sunset and sunrise; do away with daylight saving time and repeal the milk control law.

The referendum measures if passed would reduce the ton-mile fees for truckers, which were raised by the 1951 legislature; nullify the reduction in the truck loading limits which were lowered by the same legislature; repeal the cigaret tax of 3 cents a pack levied by the state legislature and nullify the school consolidation law passed this year by the legislature.

The referendum measures require only five percent of the voters' signatures (16,429), but these petitions must be completed within 90 days following the adjournment of the legislature, which is on August 1, this year.

VETERANS' BONUS? MAYBE!
Portland bankers are apprehensive of the probability that bonds offered by the state to pay veterans a bonus will not be purchased by banker groups.

In a similar situation in West Virginia the credit restraint committee refused to approve bonus bonds, and the same thing could happen here.

State Treasurer Walter Pearson threw a beanball at the head of the bond buying syndicate this week. He is greatly concerned over reports that certain eastern capitalists have refused to bid on Oregon veterans' bonus bonds.

"This refusal, if acquiesced in by Oregon's officials, would prove a cruel disappointment to thousands of Oregon veterans, who undoubtedly will feel that they have been cheated and that the mandate of Oregon people has been thwarted," Pearson said.

VOTERS' PAMPHLET ALTERED

All initiative and referendum

measures published in the voters' pamphlet, printed and distributed to all registered voters prior to primary and general elections, will have two important additions to their presentations.

One provides that all referendum measures published in the pamphlet, when revenues are involved, must include an estimate of the cost. This estimate must be printed directly above the referendum and initiative measures.

In the case of constitutional amendments there must be printed in the pamphlet a clear-cut and explanatory statement of their contents for information of the voter.

The statement would be prepared by the state treasurer, secretary of state and state budget director.

IMPRESSIVE MILITARY DISPLAY

Major General Thomas E. Rilea, adjutant general of Oregon, was presented the Legion of Merit at McCord Field, Fort Lewis, Washington, last Saturday, for his outstanding work as assistant 41st Division commander during World War II.

The accolade was made by Governor McKay preceeding one of the greatest shows of Pacific Northwest National Guard strength ever staged at this military post. The part-time soldiers displayed the brisk and intelligent action of army regulars.

On hand for the review were many state officials, members of the legislature and friends and relatives of the guardsmen in annual camp.

IRRIGATION FERTILIZER TRICK

It took 150 years to discover that it is easier to button a man's shirt down the front than up the back.

But it took 2400 years to discover that it is easier to fertilize a crop while irrigating than to make two jobs of it.

John Kimm, an alert young man of Korean descent, who runs a truck farm near Canby, in the heart of the Willamette valley, has demonstrated a valuable economic feature in agriculture. On April 15 he planted 15 acres of spinach, and on May 15 harvested and hauled to the cannery an excellent crop.

Kimm gave his planting two shots of fertilizer, using organic forms of nitrogen-urea and a fairly new product called Whale, a by-product of whale plants. He injected the liquid fertilizer into the pipes of the irrigation system.

Mrs. Alfred Burton enjoyed a birthday party on Sunday last and was well remembered by her friends.

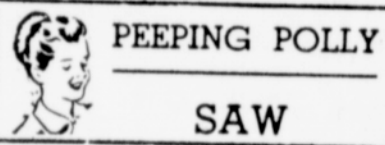

Enlistment Now Permitted After Draft Notice

Selective Service registrants who have received notice to report for preinduction examination or those registrants who have previously received their preinduction examination may enlist in the armed service of their choice on or before July 15, 1951, it was announced this week by the U. S. Army and U. S. Air Force Recruiting service headquarters, Sixth Army, in San Francisco.

Heretofore, regulations prohibited voluntary enlistment of registrants who had received notification from their local draft boards to report for examination at a specified examining and induction station.

S/Sgt. Rex Fullmer, in charge of the U. S. Army and U. S. Air Force recruiting office in Grants Pass added that due to the controlled daily flow of recruits to the Army and Air Force basic training centers, applicants should report to the recruiting station at least 5 days prior to the expected date of their departure in order to complete processing of applications for enlistment.
