A Lesson In Americanism

American Legion Auxiliary President Myrtle Clifford has requested that the following article be inserted in the NEWS to aid people don't know the proper procedure when the American flag passes in review. The article is taken from the booklet "Know Your America."

"When the flag is passing in a parade or in a review, all persons present should face the flag, stand at attention, and salute. Those present in uniform should render the military salute. When not in uniform, men should remove the headress with the right hand, holding it at the left shoulder, the hand being over the heart. Men without hats should salute in the same manner. Aliens should stand at attention. Women should salute by placing the right hand over the heart. The salute to the flag in the moving column should be rendered at the moment the flag passes.

"When the flag is not displayed and the national anthem is being played, all present should stand and face toward the music. Those in uniform should salute at the first note of the anthem, retaining this position until the last note. All others should stand at attention, men removing the headress. When the flag is displayed, all present should face toward the flag and salute.

"The 'Star-Spangled Banner' is now the national anthem of the United States of America. It was made such by Act of Congress, March 3, 1931."

Charges Brought Against 3 Valley Establishments

Charges of selling beer to a minor brought earlier this month against three Valley dealers were dismissed this week by the Oregon Liquor Control commission for the reason that testimony indicated there was insufficient factual evidence. A similar charge against the Kerby market resulted in a 20-day license suspension, effective beginning September 10.

The charges which were dismissed involved the licensees of the Elk Creek lodge at O'Brien, and the Rendezvous and Chit Chat cafe in Cave Junction. The same minor person was involved in each instance. Separate hearings on each charge were conducted in Grants Pass and the cases then presented at the August 21 meeting of the commission, which dismissed the charges due to lack of sufficient factual evidence.
