says Labor Commissioner W. E. Kimsey. The child labor law requires that each employer must get his own permit from the bureau of labor before he can put a minor under 18 years of age on a job. Those under 16 years of age have special restrictions on the kinds of work they are permitted to do and are allowed to work only between 7 a.m. and 6 p.m.

WORTHLESS CHECKS CLIMB

Worthless checks aggregating \$161,000 were presented to the state tax commission in payment for income taxes during the first six months of this year, said Ray Smith, state commissioner in charge of the income tax department. This is approximately \$100,000 more than the amount of the bad checks received during the corresponding period in 1950.

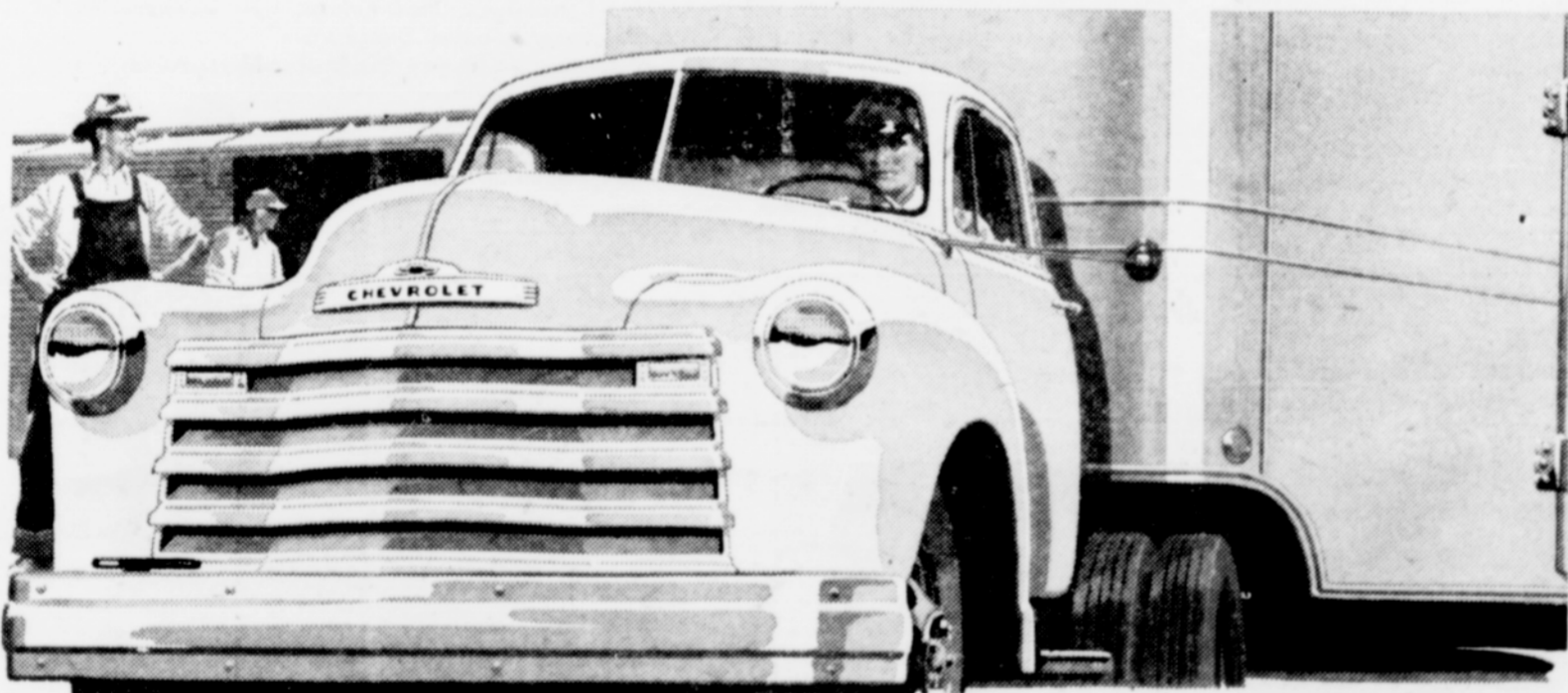
This long-time favorite, baked-custard, can be served with trimmings that make it delightfully different. Pictured are custard with raisins, cooked dried apricots, nutmeg, honey, chocolate chip, and plain served with strawberry sauce. Greasing the custard cups helps to make fruits and nutmeg stay in place.

Here is the recipe for Baked Custard:

1/4 cup sugar
1/4 teaspoon salt
3 eggs, beaten

2 cups hot milk
1 teaspoon vanilla

Combine sugar, salt, and eggs. Add milk slowly; add vanilla. Pour into custard cups; set cups in a pan of hot water. Bake at 325°F. (slow oven) until the custard is set—30 to 40 minutes.

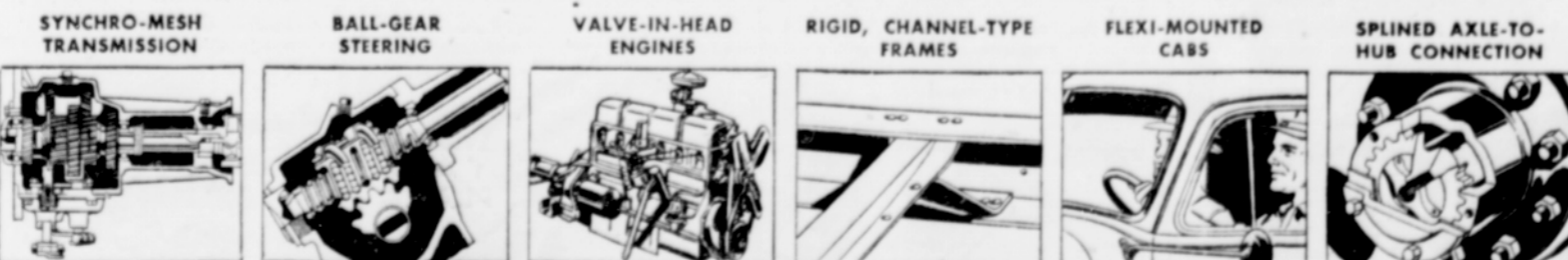
