Smoke Jumpers Have Busy Season In Western States

Since August 19, 1951, the Siski-
you Smokejumper Project has
taken action on 28 lightning
caused fires in the Northern Cal-
ifornia and Crater Lake areas.

A total of 127 individual para-
chute jumps were made to fires in
these roadless areas. Travel time
on foot, in some cases, would have
taken over one day to reach the
fire.

Re-inforcing jumpers were flown
in from Region No. 1 at Missoula,
Montana, and a smaller group from
Winthrop, Washington. Sixty men
saw duty on fires. Although a
large group of 32 men was flown
in from Missoula on August 27,
they could not be used due to the
smoke conditions at the airport
and surrounding areas.

All re-inforcing jumpers have
now been flown back to their re-
spective bases.
