power dams in the main stem of the Rogue."

C. W. Crary, who said he was a spokesman for Organized Labor, pointed out that the unions had supported plan A and had made substantial contributions in its behalf. Under the existing circumstances, however, he said, his organizations believed the new program was an advisable step and should be supported.

A large delegation from the Merlino district was present and many of them took the floor to strongly oppose breaking off of the fight for plan A. Maurice Coode, representing the Applegate committee, also spoke in opposition to the resolution.

From paragraph 2 of the resolution, which urged setting aside the revenue from the proposed Cascade gorge power plant for "impounding the water of tributaries of the Illinois river for the purpose of irrigating some 17,000 acres of new lands in the Illinois Valley..." it may be seen that residents of the Valley have a very real stake in the formulation and prosecution of a practical plan for development of the Rogue basin, of which we are a part by virtue of the fact that the Illinois river is tributary to the Rogue.

## MEAL-TIME MAGIC

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## RUSSIAN DRESSING

12 tablespoonfuls mayonnaise  
3 tablespoonfuls chopped pimientos  
12 sprigs chives  
6 tablespoonfuls chili sauce  
1 teaspoonful chopped capers  
1 tablespoonful tarragon vinegar  
3 tablespoonfuls whipped cream  
Mix in order given, chill well and serve as desired.

## THOUSAND ISLAND CREAM DRESSING

1/2 cupful mayonnaise made with tarragon vinegar  
2 tablespoonfuls finely chopped pimientos  
1/2 cupful heavy cream  
2 teaspoonfuls minced chives  
2 tablespoonfuls tomato catchup  
2 tablespoonfuls chili sauce  
2 hard-cooked eggs  
Mix in order given and chill.

## CHICKEN SALAD

1/4 cupful Roquefort cheese  
Lettuce  
Diced celery  
Cayenne pepper  
1/2 cupful French dressing  
1 hard cooked egg  
Diced chicken  
Pimiento

Add the Roquefort cheese, or snappy, or grated mild American cheese to the French dressing. Add a dash of cayenne and the hard-cooked egg yolk, rice. Arrange the lettuce nests on individual serving plates. Place a spoonful of diced chicken and celery in the center of each and pour the dressing liberally over all. Garnish each with a ring or two of the hard-cooked egg-white and a strip of pimiento.

## COUNTRY SALAD

2 cupfuls chopped cooked meat  
2 cupfuls diced cooked potatoes  
1 cupful cooked, sliced carrots  
3 hard-cooked eggs  
Cooked dressing

Lettuce  
3 small gherkins  
1 cupful diced celery  
Combine the chopped, cooked meat, which may be corned beef, tongue or ham, with sufficient cooked dressing to mold. Pack in a cold mold and chill. Likewise, thoroughly chill the cooked potatoes and carrots. Let the diced celery stand in cold water to which a little lemon juice has been added. When ready to serve, line the salad dish with lettuce, unmold the meat in the center and arrange the potatoes tossed in cooked dressing around it. Place the border of carrots around the potatoes, then the celery drained and wiped dry. Chop the whites of the hard-cooked eggs and sprinkle over the meat. Garnish with halves of gherkins and pour cooked dressing over the vegetables. Potato balls or carrot slices cut in fancy shapes may be used. Serves six.

## CUCUMBER SALAD WITH SALMON DRESSING

1 head lettuce  
2 cucumbers  
1 onion  
Salt  
1 cupful cooked salmon  
Pepper  
Cooked dressing

Break apart, wash and dry the lettuce leaves, pare the cucumbers, and chill all. For each individual service, make a bed of lettuce leaves on the plate and upon it place thin slices of cucumber, some of the finely minced onion, and a sprinkle of salt and pepper. Put the salmon into a cold bowl, shred and remove bones; add to it, until right consistency to pour, a sour highly seasoned, cooked dressing. Beat thoroughly and pour over the lettuce and cucumbers. Serves six.
