We are deeply grateful, however, to the many residents who have already acknowledged their Christmas seals."

Morrow also praised the many volunteers and the enthusiastic cooperation of newspapers, radio stations, schools, churches, theaters, civic organizations, business firms, and labor groups and said that their tireless work had given a new insight into community teamwork.

The Christmas seal sale is the sole means of support of the OTHA program in Oregon. Ninety-four percent of the money raised remains in the state.
