County Agent Remarks

POULTS MUST LEARN TO EAT AND DRINK

I would say that approximately 50 percent of the mortality in raising market turkeys takes place during the first two weeks. I will admit that it is better to lose them at this age than later on when you have a large investment in feed and labor in the birds. However, anything that can be done to reduce this early mortality will help to reduce the cost of production.

A large percentage of this early mortality is due to starvation and thirst because the poults never learn to eat and drink. We have evidence that poults have very poor eyesight when hatched. As a result, it is important to have sufficient light with an abundance of feed and water accessible at the time the poults are put under the hover. Many growers use egg case flats or poult box tops turned upside down, covered with feed and placed under and close to the outer edge of the hover for the first few days to stimulate feed consumption. Extra water containers should also be placed under and around the outer edge of the hover so the poults can't help but find it. Some growers place highly colored objects such as marbles, chopped greens mixed with clabbered milk on top of the feed to attract their attention. I don't know how successful such practices are. I think the main thing is to have plenty of feed and water available so that the poults can't help but find it. The crops should be checked and water observed to make sure they are eating and drinking.

LESS CHICKS FOR '52

From all reliable sources it looks as though Oregon will have a 10 percent decrease in the number of baby chicks for 1952. This will mean less pullets for flock replacements this fall and a decrease in eggs produced. As a result there should be and increased demand and higher prices this fall.

The main reason for this is the comparatively low egg prices and high cost of feed. A year ago a dozen eggs would purchase 11.5 pounds of feed in Oregon compared with 10.6 pounds at the present time. For the United States a dozen eggs will only purchase 9.5 pounds of feed at the present time which means Oregon is considerably above the average. When the egg-feed ration is unfavorable during the hatching season, January to May, producers buy less chicks for flock replacements. So it looks as if you producers who brood chicks in the spring will be in a good position for the fall market. And to you farm families, perhaps 25 laying hens would aid your budget also next winter.

BABY PIGS REQUIRE WARMTH

Baby pigs born when air temperatures are below 45 degrees require supplemental heat during the first few hours of their lives. Locating a heat lamp in one corner of the farrowing pen, as commonly practiced, is not enough. Heat must be applied directly to the baby pigs.

This means if the sow has her pigs in the center of the farrowing pen, heat should be placed to warm the pigs until they are at least 12 hours old. In cases like this, a 250 watt infrared heat lamp hung about three feet from the floor will furnish enough circle of warmth to include the litter. After the pigs are 12 hours old, the infrared lamp may be moved to a protected corner of the farrowing pen.

This protected corner arrangement not only keeps the young pigs warm, but reduces the chance of their being laid on by the sow.
