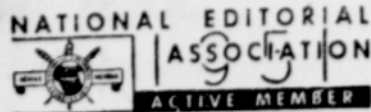

County Agent Remarks

RUNT PIGS

It has been very interesting to note records and experiments that have been conducted throughout the United States on why a "runt pig" is a runt, and they all boil down to five main reasons.

1. Poor breeding stock.
2. Poor nutrition of the sow.
3. Poor nutrition followed by disease.
4. Disease.
5. Last but not least, poor management.

Now you may ask or say, "Well, what can I do about it?" It may be that you can do more than you think. But first of all you have to:

1. Select good breeding stock; some runts are runts because they have inherited slow growth characteristics.

2. Feed sows a good gestation ration containing adequate levels of protein, vitamins and minerals, along with home grown grain.

3. Feed sows balanced ration and pig supplement during lactation, and creep feed nursing pigs a balanced ration. They can start eating by the time they are three weeks of age.

4. Pen litters according to age so older pigs won't rob the younger pigs.

5. Control external and internal parasites and disease as best you know how.

6. If in spite of your breeding, feeding and management program you still have a few runts, pen them separately. Purchase or have mixed a highly fortified ration including extra anti-biotics, vitamin B12, and high levels of other essential vitamins such as riboflavin, niacin, and pantothenic acid. I know the above deals entirely with pigs, but much of it could be adaptable to other phases of our livestock program.

BEEF

Did you know that a beef cow's future can be forecast with reasonable accuracy by the kind of calf she produces as a heifer? Records show that three year old heifers which produce light weight first calves later produce below average weight calves. On the other hand heifers that produced heavy calves as three year olds will continue to raise calves of above average weight at weaning time.

POULTRY

In the Pacific Northwest it is estimated that our poultry population for 1952 will be down approximately 15 percent from last year, and from all indications feed grains more plentiful, which will mean less laying hens and higher egg prices. So, if you have a suitable corner on your place, you may be ahead (budgetwise) to get some chicks this spring for eggs next winter.

Rev. Charles J. Anderson of Kenosha, Wisconsin, staff evangelist of Youth for Christ International, who has made five overseas trips to Europe and the Near East since World War II will speak at the Cave Junction Community church on Wednesday, March 19 at 7:45 p. m.

Anderson's most recent trip found him in six countries in the Near East, where he saw Youth for Christ organized in the country of Lebanon. This was the 76th country to start Youth for Christ groups within its boundaries. He also visited Greece, Cyprus, Egypt, Syria and Jordan, speaking to youth and adult groups in each place.

Rallies were held in such famed Bible cities as Damascus, Bethlehem, Nazareth and Jerusalem.

On previous trips, Anderson spent many months in Germany ministering to German youth and displaced person camps. He speaks German fluently and distributed hundreds of German Bibles to the German youth.

Before joining the staff of Youth for Christ International, Anderson was a chaplain in an Army war plant, a radio minister and church pastor, and Youth for Christ director in Kenosha. He has been active in the gospel ministry for 25 years.

The service Wednesday night is open to all, both young people and adults. This is an opportunity to hear up-to-date reports from the lands that are so much in present world events.

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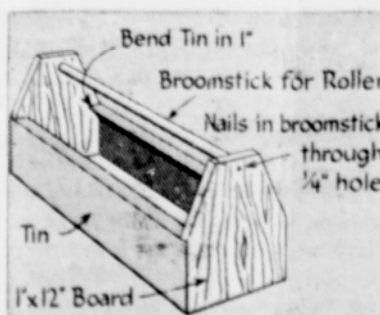

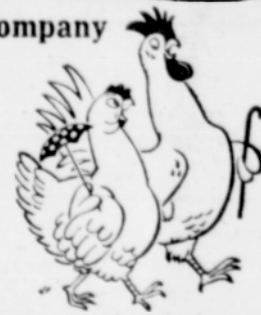
