**'Have Accident In Town'
Says State Safety Division**

Fenders are bent. Paint is scratched. Tempers are frayed. But a traffic accident on a city street still offers you a better chance at survival than one on an open highway.

This, according to the Oregon state department's traffic safety division, was proved again last week when accident analysts in the highway department sorted out last year's more than 74,000 traffic mishaps according to urban and rural location.

In 1951, the department said, 332 traffic deaths resulted from accidents on rural highways, while accidents within incorporated cities accounted for 96 deaths. In 1950, there were 330 rural deaths and 98 urban traffic killings. Death results more frequently in rural accidents, the safety division said, because of the speed at which involved vehicles are traveling.

Spring and summer months are particularly hazardous in rural areas because of increased traffic flow. Many drivers on rural roads during this period are not used to high-speed travel and are unable to keep their cars under control.

Among the citations read from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy, was the following: "The time approaches when mortal mind will forsake its corporeal, structural, and material basis, when immortal Mind and its formations will be apprehended in Science and material beliefs will not interfere with spiritual facts" (p. 402).
