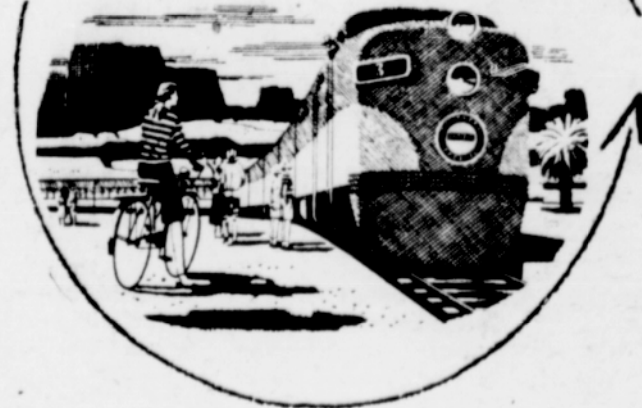
Canada is very much like the United States so we get along very well with each other. They have the same type of buildings, products, and problems as we do.

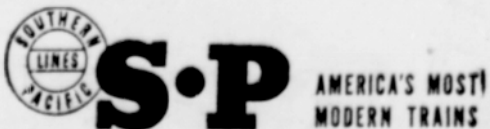
