A logger believed to be a resi-dent of Central Point was found dead by two fellow workmen about three hours after a log rolled over him near the headwaters of the north fork of Reeves Creek Wed-

nesday afternoon. The body of Hubert Blackweil was discovered at 4:15 Wednesday by two loggers, John Wortman and Harold Buth. All three were employed by the Dick Nealy Log-

Officers who investigated the accident and recovered the body reported Blackwell, a bucker, was evidently killed at about 1 p.m.

when the log rolled over him.

Coroner Virgil Hull, assistant
coroner Walter Entriken and deputy sheriff Les Tythcott investigated and returned the body to Hull and Hull Mortuary where funeral services are pending noti-fication of next of kin.

Driving north at about 6 p. m. Owens misjudged his clearence with the Asbury tanker, striking the truck near the front left wheel. Owen's car was spun crossways at at the approach and was totally de-molished from the impact and be-ing wedged between the truck and

Traffic was stalled both ways for over half an hour on the Redwoods highway until the Freeman wrecker and a logging truck pulled the coupe free. Damage to the truck's wheel and frame necessitated it being towed to Grants Pass. Arnold Thompson, Route three Arnold Thompson, Route three Medford was the truck driver.

After being freed from his folded-up car, Owens was taken to Dr. Versteeg for treatment by Valley Ambulance, and then taken home. The west fork bridge is one of the several notoriously narrow bridges between Grants Pass and the California line. The bridge itself measures but 17-feet with the approach 19 and one-half feet.

In an open letter to Mayor Salvage published below, Mrs. Small claimed possession of receipts used during her term.

Mrs. Small demanded from Mayor Salvage a retraction of the implied charges and denied having ever been previously approached relative to the missing records. Mayor Salvage received his copy

of the below-printed letter, but had no comment to make this week. The letter follows: Mr. Fred Salvage Mayor of Cave Junction

Cave Junction, Oregon I was amazed to learn for the first time and to read the scurrilous and libelous matters as officially reported by you and the City Council of Cave Junction published about me in the June 13th issue of the Illinois Valley News under the heading "Missing Records Sought". and reporting that the City Council "voted to take action to recover City records from former city re-corder, Isabelle H. Small".

RECEIPTS FOR RECORDS In the first place, you know that at the Council meeting preced-ing my retirement in February, 1951, I presented all City Records in my custody for examination and insisted that my accounts be audited, which was thereafter done by Ira S. Hall, whose written report dated February 7th, 1951, shows all accounts in balance, with the exception of petty cash in which there was an overage (due to payment out of my own pocket of minor expenses for which I was not reim-bursed)—all of which records, to-gether with the overage, was on gether with the overage, was on February 8th, 1951, turned over to your City Recorder, Charles Hubbard, who signed receipts therefor, which I have in my pos-session and exact copies of which

enclose herewith. The Council also reports through the press that you have previously tried to communicate with me at an address "believed to be incorrect." None of you have at any time since my resignation asked or contacted me about anything concerning the City's affairs. I have lived right here in Grants Pass, had telephone at all times, electric lights, city water, dog licenses, mail box, number on my house, license on my car, and have been in plain sight, and in addition, my home here has been open to, known to, and visited by your City Officials, who have also met me on the streets of Grants Pass, in the Court House, in restaurants, and passed the time of day with me, without inquiry of any kind as to the records; and I have been in Cave Junction numerous times in broad daylight and have been seen by your City Officials, without mention being made of any records missing during my service to the

RETRACTION DEMANDED This is to demand an immediate retraction by you and publication thereof of the charge that I have retained or refused to deliver up any records of the City business of Cave Junction which were in my custody during my term as City
