National Forest Timber For Sale

Sealed bids will be received by the Forest Supervisor, Post Office Building, Grants Pass, Oregon, up to and not later than 2:00 P.M. Pacific Standard time, July 28, 1952, for all merchantable windthrown and damaged timber standing or down and all beetle-killed, damaged, or susceptible timber marked or designated for cutting located on an area embracing approximately 20 acres within Sections 20, 21, 28, 29 and 30, T. 40 S., R. 7 W., W.M. and lying on Little Elder Creek within the Illinois River watershed, Siskiyou National Forest, Oregon, estimated to be 255,000 bd. ft., more or less, of Douglas-fir, 3,000 bd. ft., more or less, of Ponderosa pine, 3,000 bd. ft., more or less, of sugar pine, and 12,000 bd. ft., more or less, of white fir and other species of sawtimber. All windthrown timber and all dead timber within the sale boundaries will be considered as marked for cutting and the sale contract will require that all such timber be felled. Damaged trees and beetle susceptible trees to be cut will be marked or designated for cutting by a forest officer. The trees to be cut occur singly or in widely scattered small groups along the Little Elder road and around the boundaries of the previously cut-over areas. No bid of less than \$8.20 per M bd. ft. for Douglas-fir, Ponderosa pine and sugar pine, and \$3.65 per M bd. ft. for white fir and other species will be considered. In addition to the price bid for stumpage a cooperative deposit of \$0.75 per M bd. ft. to be used by the Forest Service to cover the cost of slash disposal, for the total cut of timber under the terms of the agreement, will be required. \$2,000.00 must accompany each bid to be applied on the purchase price, refunded, or retained in part as liquidated damages according to the conditions of sale. The right to reject any and all bids is reserved. Forest Service bid forms for use in submitting sealed bids and full information concerning the timber, the conditions of sale and the submission of bids should be obtained from the District Ranger, Cave Junction, Oregon, or the Forest Supervisor, Grants Pass, Oregon, before bids are submitted. On July 8 at 9:00 A. M. a forest officer will meet interested parties at the Illinois Valley Ranger Station, Cave Junction, Oregon to explain the conditions of the sale and to conduct a tour to show the timber offered for sale.
