Myrtle Kelly Sues Tuckers Visit For Unpaid Wages Crater Lake

A former IVHS teacher suspended in 1951 for lack of proper state credentials has filed suit in Josephine county circuit court against five school officials seeking \$3,365 in unpaid wages.

Myrtle G. Kelly, 1510 Fruitdale drive, Grants Pass, in her complaint filed by a Medford attorney alleges she was illegally removed from her position Oct. 5, 1951 after having signed her contract. The reason given at the time of her dismissal was she did not possess the proper state certificate for the position to which she had been assigned. The complaint charged Mrs. Kelly, on the contrary, did possess proper credits, proof of which she submitted at the time of her dismissal.

Mrs. Kelly has not taught since the 1951 school board suspended her from the high school staff.

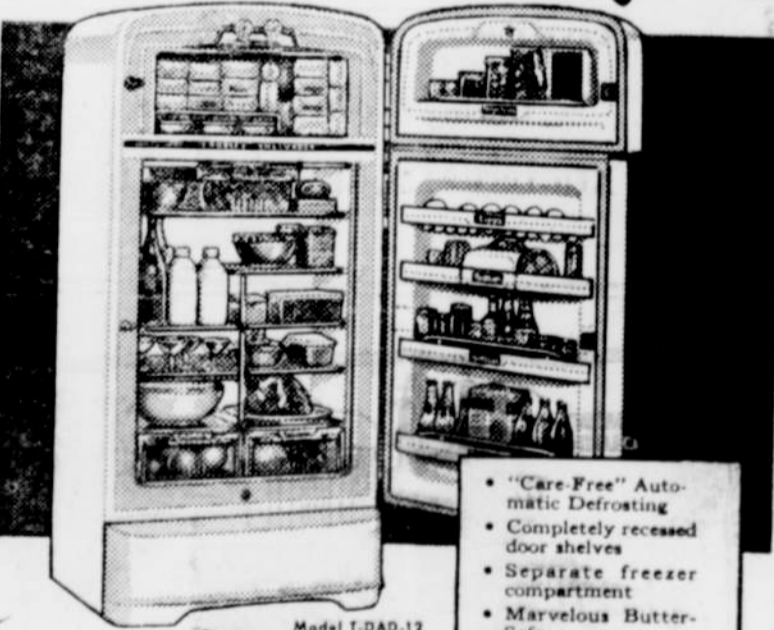

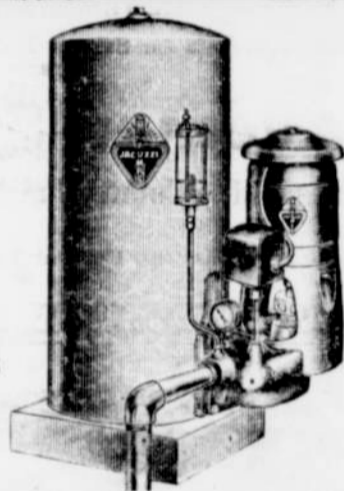

HINTS for the Handyman

NO. 7 REMOVING SCRATCHES

To remove shallow scratches or hair-line cracks, soften finish so it runs together—with alcohol for shellac, turpentine for paint or varnish, lacquer thinner for lacquer. Let dry 48 hours and rub smooth with rottenstone, clean and wax. Sometimes painting little scratches with iodine or rubbing with walnut meat will do the job. Wax of the right shade may suffice.
