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The History Behind the Lack of a **CITY SEWER SYSTEM**
A city sewerage system will become a reality in Cave Junction during the near future if the city administration is allowed to carry out its long-range plan for local improvement. City residents will be interested in learning the facts behind the attempts made before the present administration took office.
In 1949 and 1950 there was government money available for loans to municipalities for preliminary survey for water and sewerage projects, in amounts of several thousand dollars payable when bonds were sold for the specified project.
Your city government, at that time, hired an engineer to make a preliminary sewerage disposal survey and the city started on an application for a loan from this government fund, with which the engineer could have, and should have, been paid.
The application for this loan was not correctly filled out and was returned for further information.
Why this application was not correctly and promptly completed by the former administration and again submitted for approval, we are unable to say.
The city incurred a bill of \$1350 by hiring an engineer to make the preliminary survey—which was well laid out.
No action was taken on this survey by the former administration and your present city officials were left the task of figuring how to pay this bill of \$1350.
Last winter at a League of Oregon Cities meeting in Medford, your present mayor had the pleasure of meeting a man from the office handling these loans to municipalities, and he asked the mayor "Why didn't you finish and return the application for the money for your preliminary sewerage disposal survey?"
The mayor had no answer for what had been done before he himself had taken office. However, the gentleman said he would consider another application.
The present administration then applied for the loan, but because of the Korean war, the funds had been withdrawn.
The present city officials were forced to budget for money to pay the engineer for the survey. Approximately half of the amount is yet to be paid.
