



The well-attended meeting heard a discussion of the rapidly-diminishing timber stand and the optimistic arguments following in light of greater salvage of timber pro ducts, increasing agricultural development and mining in this area

Ranger Harold Bowerman, in his talk on what the U. S. Forest Schvice is doing in regard to harvest ing timber, stressed the salvage of beetle-killed trees and windfalls, and the importance of the proper disposal of slash.
