FARM NEWS

Looking Toward 1953 Fall Milk Supply

Cows and heifers bred between November 20 and December 31 will calve between September 1 and October 12 next fall. Heifers bred a month or two early will do well if fed generously between breeding and calving dates. There is considerable variation between dairymen when the breeding age of heifers is discussed. Many dairymen will agree that Jersey heifers should be bred when they are 13 months of age, Guernsey heifers at 15 months of age, and Holstein heifers at 17 months of age.

One important factor to consider in breeding any heifer is the size and how well she has grown. If the heifer is not well grown, the breeding should be delayed a month or two and allow the heifer to increase in size. It is necessary to consider the size of the heifer in relationship to the breed and the average size of the animals in the particular line of breeding.

If you prefer to breed a month or two early, it will be advisable to feed additional grain to the heifer between breeding and calving dates.

Learn Best Storage Methods for Vegetables

Storing vegetables is a means of prolonging the supply of fresh produce during the winter months. There are many different types of storage places being used by gardeners. These vary from the pit in the ground to the basement or attic of the home.

It is important to know the types of storage conditions which are best for the particular crop that you plan to store. Potatoes keep best in fairly high humidity, and the temperatures between 34 and 38 degrees F. Also, they require good circulation of air. Onions that are well cured in the field can be stored successfully when the humidity is about average and the temperature between 36 and 45 degrees F. If onions are frozen, they must not be handled until they have thawed out. Repeated freezing and thawing will damage onions. Squash and pumpkins can be stored for several months if the temperature is around 55 to 65 degrees F. This temperature is slightly higher than for most vegetables and fruit.

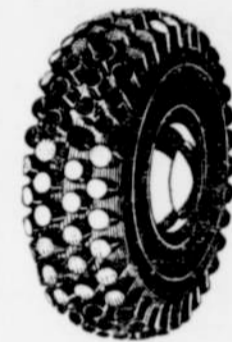

If you do not have a card, get one from your nearest school or send the following information to County School Supt., Courthouse, Grants Pass, Ore.:

Names of children over 4 years, under 20 years as of October 25, 1952. Print name, age, male or female, correct address (not P. O. Box), name of father, mother or guardian.

Write name of school child is attending, including business college, university, etc.

NOTE: Include children in service or married, under 20 years of age. If you have a child who is disabled and unable to attend school for six months or more, and not completed 12th grade, please specify.

Josephine County School District LOSES \$90 from School Fund sources for each child whose name is not included in the census.
