As no one witnessed the accident details are not exact, but it is believed some part of the power saw Welch was operating, possibly a broken chain, hit him, leaving a gash in his head at about 11:15 38 IV High Students tree falling at about the same time is believed to be responsible for Welch's broken wrist.

He was taken by Valley Ambulance for treatment at the Medical Center and then into Josephine General.

Cattle Branding, Moving Explained

State brand inspector C. E. Chamberlain spoke to a joint gathering of the Illinois Valley Farm bureau and Stockmen's Assn., Dec. 11 at the high school on the transportation of cattle and branding

Chamberlain informed the crowd only a transportation slip containing the owner's name and address and description of stock is needed for the moving of cattle not to be sold.

Cattle just purchased, according to Chamberlain, requires the pur chaser to obtain the signature of the seller in addition to the transportation slip.

Branding in Oregon is not compulsory, but is recommended by Chamberlain as an identification mark. Livestock losses can be reported to a brand inspector, live stock detective or the sheriff's office.

Brand inspection and cattle detection is in danger of being dropped in Oregon due to lack of funds, he said. Both farm bureau and cattlemen assn. members present went on record approving an assessment to continue this state program.
