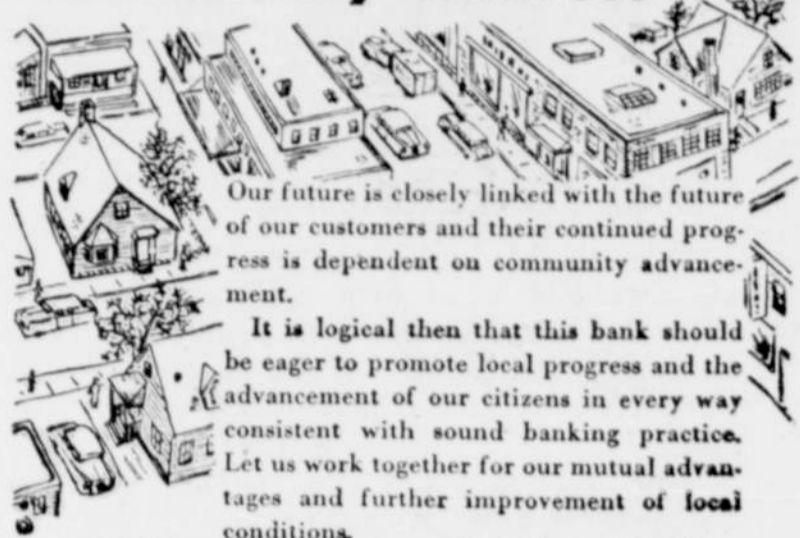

**National Forest Timber For Sale**

Oral auction bids will be received by the Forest Supervisor or his authorized representative at the office of the District Ranger, Cave Junction, Oregon, beginning at 2:00 P.M., PST., January 20, 1953, for all the live timber marked or designated for cutting and all merchantable dead timber located on an area embracing about 15 acres within Sections 3 and 10T, 18N., R4E, H.M., Brokenkettle Cr. drainage, Siskiyou National Forest, California, estimated to be 130,000 bd. ft., more or less, of Douglas-fir and other species of sawtimber. No bid of less than \$11.45 per M bd. ft. for Douglas-fir and other species will be considered. In addition to the prices bid for stumpage, a cooperative deposit of \$0.55 per M bd. ft. to be used by the Forest Service for paying the cost of slash disposal, for the total cut of timber under the terms of the agreement will be required. As a qualification for oral bidding, all bidders must submit a sealed bid accompanied by the required payment to the District Ranger, Cave Junction, Oregon, prior to 2:00 P.M., PST., January 20, 1953. Sealed bids will be posted at the beginning of the auction for the information of all bidders. \$1,500 must accompany each bid, to be applied on the purchase price, refunded, or retained in part as liquidated damages, according to the conditions of sale. If an oral bid is declared to be high at the closing of the auction, the bidder must immediately confirm the oral bid by submitting it in writing on a Forest Service bid form. The right to reject any and all bids is reserved. Forest Service bid forms for use in submitting sealed bids and full information concerning the timber, the conditions of sale and the submission of bids should be obtained from the District Ranger, Cave Junction, Oregon before bids are submitted.

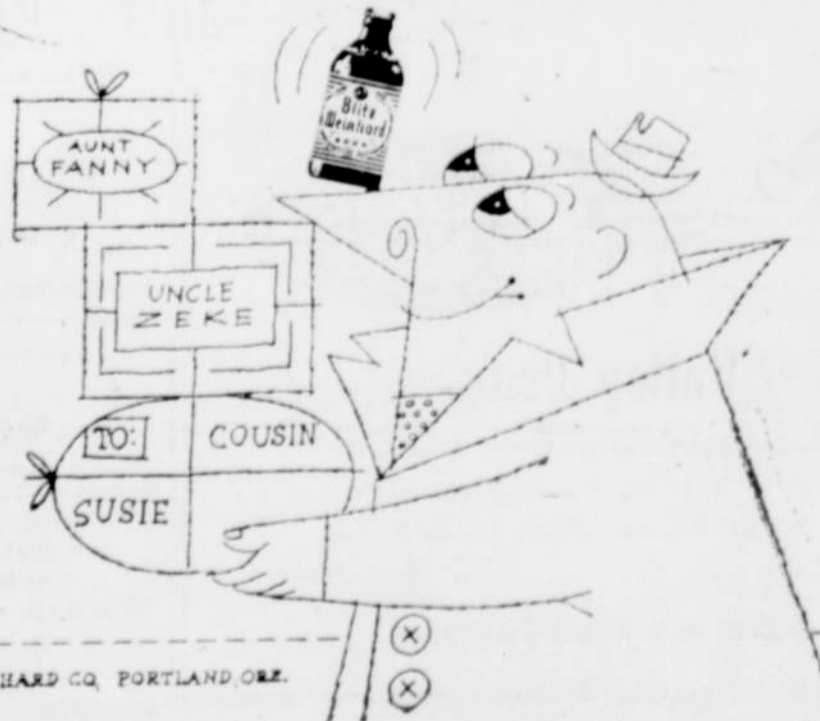
