Our Trade With Russia

A new period of coming industrial activity, and, indeed, a most attractive vision of America's opportunity in Russia was recently unfolded by one the Czar's chief advisors, Professor Melnikoff, during his visit to the United States to study industrial and economic conditions obtaining here.

This distinguished Russian, who is a member of the Czar's cabinet, paints in glowing colors the picture of a new commercial field in the Far East, and sets forth the magnitude and resources of the great Russian Empire with its 200 million souls and an area of nearly nine million square miles. Siberia alone has an area of about 41 million square miles, a territory larger in extent than that of the United States and claiming to have the largest timber resources in the world.

Within the borders of the vast empire, which is primarily an agricultural country, capable of producing all kinds of grain and fruits, it has 120 million tillers of the soil, who have been greatly benefitted as a consequence of the new land policy begun by the government in 1906, and large tracts of land are now passing into the hands of peasant proprietors.

Industrial development along modern lines is contemplated on a gigantic scale, projects costing hundreds of millions of dollars, will require immense quantities of machinery and supplies of American manufacture. Machinery and equipment valued at \$300,000,000 will be required for the first year's transportation projects under headway.

The transportation facilities of the empire are to be enlarged, more feeders running north and south from the great Trans-Siberian railway will be constructed that will tap virgin territory, and ship canals, unequalled in the world, will be built, and with the railroads will link together all the localities that possess rich resources in mineral, grain and timber. Over 25,000 miles of new railways will be constructed.

The coal, iron and steel districts of the south will be penetrated and will be among the first to receive immediate attention in the economic development policy about to be instituted. The mineral wealth of the Steppes provinces will be made available and the vast grain supplies of Western Siberia will be provided with a cheaper outlet. Oil, timber and coal fields are also on the program for attention.

American methods of construction and management appeal to the Russian government and practical men of the United States will be installed to counsel and direct much of this great enterprise. At this time when the eyes of many American manufacturers are very largely centered upon the development of the immense resources of the Russian empire, the contemplated needs of the Russian government for many years to come makes a vision attractive to behold. Russia is now on the verge of the greatest period of industrial prosperity in the history of that country. American manufacturers will enter that field with prospects of success, though the system of extended credits will in a great measure determine that success. Our

manufacturers will undoubtedly profit by the experience gained in their dealings with the South American countries when in competing with European manufacturers they were compelled to extend credits equal to that of their rivals in order to remain in the field and maintain a permanent trade. This new era of industrial progress and development in the Far East will bring many millions of dollars into American channels of trade and provide a new field for our wares.

Congress cannot make the investigation into the Print Paper Trust too thorough, or too drastic.
