L. C. Kramer, field superintendent of the Mutual Creamery Company, of Portland, was in Halsey Wednesday for the purpose of establishing a cream receiving station here. Mr. Kramer has rented the building next to the drug store and will return here next week to have it put in proper shape. The necessary equipment for cream testing will be installed right away and the agency will be ready to receive cream.

When interviewed about the receiving station, Mr. Kramer said an expert creamery man will be put in charge next week and a strictly honest butterfat test given and all cream producers will receive the highest market price for their product, besides saving the cost of transportation. The local agency will pay by check every day.

The Mutual Creamery Co. is the largest concern of its kind in the United States, having eighteen large creameries in operation, one of which is in Portland. Last year this company manufactured nearly \$2,000,000 worth of butter.

Saves Eggs

SPONGE CAKE

1 cup sugar
1/2 cup water
3 eggs
2 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder
1 cup flour
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup cold water
1 teaspoon flavoring

DIRECTIONS:—Beat sugar and water until syrupy, add a thread and add to the stiffly beaten whites of eggs, beating until the mixture is cold. Sift together three times the flour, salt and baking powder; beat yolks of eggs until thick; add a little at a time flour mixture and egg yolks alternately to white of egg mixture, stirring after each addition. Add 1/2 cup cold water and flavoring. Mix lightly and bake in moderate oven one hour.
